

ROSEBURG IS GIVEN PLACES

Reorganization of Coos Bay, Boise and Idaho Railway Effected.

In order to let the business men of Roseburg take hold of the Coos Bay, Boise and Idaho Railway project on the same basis that the Coos Bay men are interested, a reorganization of the company has become necessary. The plan is to divide the directors and capital of the holding company between Coos Bay and Roseburg, each terminus of the present project taking half. In order to do this, some of the local officers have to resign and allow Roseburg men to take their place on the board.

Patrick Hennessey, who has been president of the company since its organization, has tendered his resignation and urges that it be accepted. In doing so, he says his time is so taken up with his private interests and duties on the city council that he cannot take care of the duties of the other position. However, he will remain ready to assist it in any way possible. C. C. Carter of Myrtle Point, has also resigned.

The remaining local directors are Wm. Grimes and Tom Bennett of Marshfield, and J. R. Smith, J. C. Gray and L. F. Falkenstein of North Bend. It is likely that some further changes will be necessary to allow Marshfield and North Bend equal representation.

W. H. Fisher, cashier of the Douglas County Bank; Sam S. Johnson, Fred G. Stewart, Al. Creason, Editor Lee Wimberly are the Roseburg directors, and Banker Henry Booth the trustee of Roseburg's stock.

J. C. Gray reported at a meeting of the directors of the road last night that Roseburg is taking hold of the project in good shape and will soon be ready to furnish its share of the cost of the survey and other incidental expenses.

H. C. Diers, who was in Roseburg, says that Roseburg is alarmed that the Natron cutoff will make the line through Roseburg merely a siding, all of the through trains being run by the new road and the division point being moved to Natron. Consequently unless the Coos Bay line is made a reality and Roseburg gets on it, much of that city's importance will be lost. Mr. Diers says that Roseburg is making a wonderful advancement.

BIG SHEEP DRIVES FROM CURRY COUNTY

Over 6,500 Head Being Driven From Rogue River Country to Douglas Ranges.

C. V. Dymont, telegraph editor of the Portland Telegram, returned today from a week's trip along the coast to Port Orford. He will leave on the Alliance for Portland. He reports that two large sheep drives are being made out of Curry county this week, both to Douglas county. Five thousand head picked up on the ranges south of the Rogue are on their way to new range in Douglas county, secured by the purchasers, Haunon and Pelton, formerly of Klamath Marsh. The other band of 1,500 is going to a Roseburg firm for consignment to Portland and Seattle markets.

EXHUME SUTTON'S BODY.

Will Determine Whether He Was a Suicide or Murdered.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 14.—The body of Lieut. Chas. Sutton Jr., U. S. M. C., whose death has been the subject of considerable inquiry, will be disinterred and an autopsy will be held to determine whether the right arm was broken, thus making it impossible for him to fire the shot that cost him his life.
