Get Piano.—The Marshfield high school will soon have a new piano through the cooperation of the pupils and the school board. The pupils had, through receipts from entertainments and other sources, about \$150 on hand and to this the school board added \$300. A \$450 piano has been ordered and meanwhile, a piano has been secured for use in the schools.
