NOTICE OF ANNUAL MUNICIPAL ELECTION OF THE CITY OF MARSHFIELD.

Notice is hereby given that on Tuesday, the 7th day of December, 1909, there will be held at the City Hall of the City of Marshfield, Coos County, Oregon, a regular general election, for the purpose of electing a Mayor to serve for the term of two years; for the purpose of electing two members of the Common Council to serve for the term of three years each; for the purpose of electing one member of the Common Council to serve for the term of one year; and for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters for their approval or rejection "An Act to amend the Charter of Marshfield, Coos County, Oregon, so the Council of Marshfield shall have power to grant franchises for street and other railway purposes without petition of the owners of property abutting upon the streets occupied thereby; but, subject to the right of the Council to refer the ordinance, granting such franchise, to a vote of the people of Marshfield, Oregon, before they become operative, and to the right of the people to demand the 'referendum' thereon as provided by law; and providing that such ordinance shall not become operative until Thirty Days after final passage," and for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters of said city for their approval or rejection "An Ordinance granting to J. M. Blake, his heirs and assigns, the right to build, maintain and operate a railway system upon Front Street North, Front Street South, Broadway North, Broadway South, and Kruse Avenue East in Marshfield, Coos County, Oregon, to be operated by electricity or other mechanical power except steam, for the purpose of carrying passengers, express, baggage, mail and freight, and requiring grantee to handle, haul and switch cars or trains of cars of railroads over his tracks at such uniform and regular rates and under reasonable regulations to be fixed by said City of Marshfield."

The said election will be held between the hours of Nine o'clock A.M. and Six o'clock P.M.

That J. R. Lightner, John Bear, and A. G. Aiken have been heretofore by the Common Council of said City appointed as Judges of said election, and F. M. Friedberg, C. A. Pennock and Roy Lawhorn as Clerks of said election. JOHN W. BUTLER, Recorder of the City of Marshfield, Coos County, Oregon.

MYRTLE POINT POINTERS.
News of Upper Coquille Valley From The Enterprise.
A daughter was born to Mr. and Mrs. Iam Smith at their home in Myrtle Point on Friday, the 24th.

For the first time in many months a gang broke loose Monday night and raised some disturbance. Pickets were torn from a number of fences during the height of the "fun."

Mrs. D. E. Norcross leaves Saturday for Eugene where she will join her husband who has been appointed to the pastorate of a Christian church in a town near that city.

A rifle and a pair of trousers were taken from the Laird livery barn one night recently, and those who have been investigating believe that they are on the track of the party who took them.

Ed. Harris has received a clipping from a Jackson, Cal., newspaper which gives an account of a music teacher who had been living there under the name of C. L. Davenport, with a woman. It is believed that the subject of the article was Prof. Thom, who disappeared from this place some time ago, leaving his wife and children. When inquiries were made at Jackson, Davenport and the woman disappeared.

Fred Cobb was sentenced to the penitentiary for 15 years and Bert LaBarge for 14 years by Circuit Judge Gatens at Portland last Saturday. These are the men who held up and robbed Chester M. Lee, formerly of Myrtle Point, on the night of September 27th. They took a gold watch and \$19 in cash from him, enforcing their demands with a revolver. Cobb is 21 and LaBarge 29 years of age, but they have a criminal record and the judge did not consider a recommendation for leniency. During his visit here Mr. Lee showed a photograph of himself taken after the holdup which showed a wound on his face made by the men when they demanded the watch which he valued highly he showed fight and the highwaymen handled him roughly.

EDITOR'S FATHER DEAD.
"Grandpa" Dean Passes Away at Coquille At 89.
The Coquille Herald says: "Grandpa" Dean, for twenty-nine years a familiar figure on the streets of Coquille, has passed away. The years of man are three score years and ten, but he has trod the walks of men on nineteen years borrowed time, being 89 years and 11 days of age at the time of his death.

"Mr. Dean was born in Tennessee, Nov. 13, 1820. At the age of 20, he went to St. Louis, Mo. Later, he located on a homestead near Rolla, Mo., where he was married to Melinda Fulson in 1846. To this union were born one daughter, and seven sons; five sons surviving him—P. E. Dean of Missouri, W. H. Dean of Oklahoma, A. J. Dean of Colorado, and R. J. and D. F. Dean of Coquille.

"He remained on his homestead till 1880, when he started for Oregon, coming by way of Texas, where he spent the winter. In the spring of 1881, with his wife and son, D. F. Dean, he came to Coquille, joining another son, the late J. A. Dean, founder of the Herald."

JUMPED FROM TRAIN.
Benj. E. Cope of Coquille, Killed While Insane.
"The body of Benjamin E. Cope, mentioned last week as having been killed by a running train at Dresco, North Dakota, reached this place and was buried at the Masonic cemetery on Saturday. Mr. Cope came to his death by jumping from a running train during a fit of temporary insanity superinduced by an attack of scarlet fever from which he suffered some time since. He had suffered such spells before, and was examined by the Coos county court, but was not deemed insane. At the time of his death he was in charge of two attendants, but got an opportunity to step away from them while the rear door of the car was open, and deliberately leaped to his death."
