RAMONA TO SUCCEED CZARINA?

Southern Pacific Charters Vessel For Oregon Coast Service.

SEATTLE, Jan. 31.—The steamship Ramona, now idle at Eagle Harbor, was chartered by the Southern Pacific Railway for service on the Oregon coast, probably to replace the wrecked Czarina.

The Ramona is 195 feet long and has excellent passenger equipment. She was built in Alameda, Cal., was at first operated on the Southern California run and her last service was between Seattle and Vancouver. The charterer will take possession February 5.
