GRANTS DELAY IN ODD CASE

Members of Senate Claim They Are Not Subject to Order of Court.

(By Associated Press.) KANSAS CITY, Feb. 12.—Following the sensational developments in the Swope case when Dr. B. C. Hyde was arrested charged with the murder of his wife's uncle, Col. Thomas H. Swope, and the grand jury was summoned to convene and make a thorough investigation of all the circumstances surrounding the Swope mystery, a battle of lawyers to secure depositions of important witnesses in the damage suits brought by Dr. Hyde against John G. Paxton for alleged slander was resumed.

In this civil suit, Dr. Hyde demands \$50,000 actual damages and \$50,000 punitive damages because Paxton wrote a letter to Stewart S. Fleming, an executor of the Swope estate at Columbia, Tenn., containing statements which Dr. Hyde charges slandered him.

MYRTLE POINT BONDS.

Issue of \$22,000 Accepted By Eastern Buyers.

The \$22,000 waterworks bonds for the city of Myrtle Point were received Tuesday and during Tuesday afternoon and Wednesday Mayor Benson and City Recorder Rose were busy attaching their signatures to the bonds and the coupons. There are forty-four bonds of \$500 denomination and each bond carries sixty interest coupons for \$15, which are due every six months during the life of the bonds. To make these legal the mayor and recorder have had to write their signatures 2,684 times, which was no small task.

The bonds have been returned the Chicago firm that made the successful bid for the issue and it is expected that the money will be returned and made available for use in another week or two.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.
