**CHAS. DRAIN FOUND DEAD.**

Son of Founder of Drain Shot By His Own Gun.

ROSEBURG, Ore., March 5.—Charles Drain, one of the well-known pioneers of Southern Oregon, and who has lived in the vicinity of the town of Drain all his life, was found dead about a mile from his home. Coroner Jewett was summoned to the scene and left on the 9:15 train this morning for Drain. From the information obtainable, it seems that in the afternoon to look at some wood Mr. Drain went out in the timber in the afternoon and took a hammerless rifle along with him, thinking that possibly he might have an opportunity of using it. Night came on and Mr. Drain did not return home. The family was much alarmed over his non-appearance and at an early hour in the morning friends started in search of the missing man. Going to that part of the woods where it was supposed that Mr. Drain had gone, the body was soon discovered. It was ascertained that the man had been shot and had been dead some hours. All evidence points to the accidental discharge of the gun the man was carrying. Rumors of suicide are given little credence.

Mr. Drain leaves a wife, two daughters, Miss Moda, who is living in Eastern Oregon, and Miss Alta, at Drain; also a son, Rolla Drain, who lives at Eugene. His father was the founder of the town of Drain. He was a member of the I. O. O. F., the Woodmen of the World, and the B. P. O. E. He was about 50 years of age. It is known that he carried a \$10,000 policy in one of the old line life insurance companies.

**W. C. T. U. NOTES.**

The Twelfth district W. C. T. U. of Missouri (Independence district), has doubled its number of unions in one year. Much work has been done among the children especially along Sunday school and scientific temperance essay lines. The Independence union gave medals in the ward schools and a prize of ten dollars in the high school. Bates City has done fine Sunday school work. Waverly has pushed medal contests, and Odesa has emphasized Red Letter Days and social meetings.

The Humane Society of Kansas City, Mo., at the instance of two women members, undertook to provide a Christmas dinner for the underfed horses of the city. A number of Chicago women have taken up the plan of putting tags upon unblanketed and otherwise mistreated horses standing in the streets. The printed tag reads thus:

"To My Owner and Driver: Dear Master—Please blanket me, for I am cold. Feed, water and shoe me regularly, and see that my harness fits comfortably, for I can feel and suffer as well as yourself. I am speaking through the Anti-Cruelty Society."

**NOTE OF WARNING.**

In the Harrison Street municipal court, Chicago, a few days ago, a man was brought before Judge Fake on the charge of enticing young boys into a life of crime. A boy of fifteen, from a good and respected suburban family, told the court how this modern Fagin had offered to teach him how to steal, pick pockets, enter houses for burglary, and kindred criminal pursuits. Three other boys, all in their teens, gave similar testimony. Judge Fake gave the man the highest sentence the law allowed, and placed the boys under probation to Henry Nell, associated with Judge Cleland in his work for the reform justice. In this case, through information given by a boy, the police arrested the criminal before he had actually led the boys into a life of crime; but the revelation will increase the watchfulness of parents. Boys and girls should not be allowed too free a rein in visiting the congested parts of a city; or for that matter, in associating with strange persons anywhere.

**TO ADVERTISE OREGON.**

Louis W. Hill to Send Car of Oregon Products Over Nation.  
PORTLAND, Ore., March 5.—Oregon is to get wide publicity throughout the east during the coming year if the plan of Louis W. Hill, president of the Great Northern Railway, works out. Mr. Hill proposes to gather exhibits of what Oregon raises and place them in an exhibit car which will be sent east and routed through the sections of the country where it will do the most good. That these exhibits will accomplish a great deal, accompanied as they will be by a lecturer, is certain and that many thousands of settlers will be brought to this state as a direct result is believed.

An actual demonstration of what this state can produce in fruits, grains, grasses, vegetables, etc., will unquestionably prove convincing to the easterner. Attractive literature will accompany the exhibit car, telling of opportunities here for the home seeker and the lecturer will answer questions about this state. President Hill asks support for his plan from Oregon people in the gathering of exhibits with which to equip the car. His company now has representatives in this state collecting information to be used in the advertising campaign to be waged by Mr. Hill.
