SHOULD KEEP OUT THE HINDUS.

THE RECENT Hindu riots at St. John and the protest of the British Consul recalls that some good advice was given this country on this subject by no less an authority than the British Medical Journal, which called attention to the desirability of the most stringent quarantine regulations. The advice offered by this eminent medical authority was also in line with what Dr. Charles W. Stiles of the Country Life Commissioner gave utterance to on his trip to the Coast.

Dr. Stiles, who is the Government's hookworm expert, accompanied the commission for the purpose of looking into the sanitary needs of the different rural sections of the country. He said while west that the real yellow peril to be feared on the Pacific Coast is not an invasion of Japanese with their peculiar business tactics and the danger of eventual hostilities, but rather an invasion of oriental diseases.

The Coast had already been enlightened regarding the bubonic plague and what devastation it is likely to cause if it is allowed to get a foothold. Dr. Stiles, however, mentioned particularly certain diseases that afflict dwellers in the rural districts of India and predicted terrible results if these diseases should be transmitted by Hindu immigrants to the people of our own farming communities.

The British Medical Journal describes also the "oriental sore" which Hindus are likely to bring with them. There are three varieties of it. One is a painless swelling, yellow with a red margin, usually appearing on the face and never breaking down. Another is a large and intensely painful ulcer, and the third is the Delhi boil, which is the most formidable affliction of its kind. These diseases are due to parasites and are said to be communicable. The worst thing about them is that they are far more virulent when contracted by peoples other than the Hindus.

IS THOUGHT MURDERED.

Railroad Watchman May be Victim of Car Thieves.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., March 30.—Edward Scott, a railroad watchman, was found dead in the Union Pacific yards here last night. It is believed he was murdered by box car thieves. There is no clue. He evidently was killed by a blow on the head.

HARD PAVING GETS CHEAPER

Mayor Simon of Portland Forces Contractors Down to \$1.44 per Yard.

PORTLAND, Or., March 30.—The price of asphalt pavement touched the lowest point yet reached in Portland when the Barber Asphalt Company submitted to the city executive board a bid to pave Columbia street from Third to Sixteenth with asphalt laid on a four-inch concrete base for \$1.44 a square yard. The lowest price made heretofore was \$1.60 a square yard for the same kind of hard surface laid on the same thickness of concrete. The company put in another low bid on Hoyt street, offering to lay asphalt on a five-inch base of concrete for \$1.58 a square yard.

Preparations of the Warner-Quinn Company of New York to enter the local paving field is apparently the cause of the big reduction. Only a few months ago asphalt was being laid for \$2 and more a square yard. A slight reduction in the price of bitulithic pavement was made by the Pacific Bridge Company, a tender of \$1.95 a square yard having been submitted.

Mayor Simon is holding up a number of contracts awarded by the city executive board at its last meeting previous. The contracts were awarded for \$2 a square yard and the Mayor has recently stated that no more contracts would be let at that figure.

SCHOOL BOARD TAKES ACTION

Petition of High School Alumni Answered by Resolution of Directors.

The petition of the Marshfield High School Alumni asking that F. A. Golden be retained in the highest position in the local public schools has been rejected by the School Board. The following self explanatory resolution was passed by the Board this morning after considering the petition:

"Whereas, A petition has been presented to the Board of Directors of School District No. 9, by the Alumni Association of the Marshfield High School, signed by 354 names, many of whom are neither legal voters nor taxpayers and the majority of whom are not parents of children attending the schools, asking that Mr. F. A. Golden be retained at the head of the schools; Now therefore be it,

Resolved, That having kept closely in touch with the schools of the District and having carefully studied their present efficiency we feel that the best interests of the taxpayers and the cause of education will be subserved in the pursuance of the plans adopted by the Board for their future conduct."
