## WHERE TO SEE HALLEY COMET

### Prof. Campbell of Lick Observatory Issues Statement About It.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 12.—Professor W. W. Campbell, director of Lick observatory, gave out the following interview concerning Halley's comet:

"From now on, observers who are not in the strong glare of electric lights should have no difficulty in obtaining a good view of the comet. They should look for it due east just before the first traces of dawn appear, about 10 degrees above the horizon. The brilliant starlike object a little south of the east point is the planet Venus. The comet will be about ten degrees farther north than Venus and a little further above the horizon. The tail will be seen pointing upward and to the right, directly away from the sun.

"The morning view of the comet should improve as it gets closer to us, until May 16 or 17. The head will then probably be visible for three or four days, to ordinary observers, in the glare of the bright sky, while passing the sun on May 18, and thereafter the comet will be an evening object.

"Its head for a few evenings will be just a few degrees north of the west point. Unfortunately, the moon will interfere with views of the tail quite seriously, I think for several evenings.

### FORETOLD BY COMET.

#### Strange Actions of Heavenly Visitor At King's Death.

NEW YORK, May 12.—That Halley's comet behaved itself in an unusual manner just about the time of the accession of King George V is the report of scientists in Bermuda, brought here by wireless from the steamship Bermudian at sea. According to the dispatch the comet on the night of the death of King Edward and the accession of his son, became visible in Bermuda at 2 o'clock in the morning and a decidedly red tinge was noted in its tail. At 12:30 that night the Fort Hamilton garrison, Bermuda, began to fire a salute in honor of the king. As the last report died away the observer saw a sudden flaring up at the end of the comet's tail. The head also glowed as a ball of red fire.

For five minutes the phenomenon lasted and was seen by a hundred negroes at work on the docks. They were overcome with terror and fell on their knees and began to pray, thinking that the end of the world was coming. Many persons connected the strange light with the death of King Edward.
