

MALONEY .- At Mercy Hospital, North Bend, Oregon, on June 21, 1910, Mrs. SUSAN MALONEY, aged 65 years, eight months and 3 days.

Susan Collins was born in Ennis, County Clare, Ireland, October 18, 1844. When she was sixteen years old she came to the United States, first making her home in Buffalo and later in Rochester, N. Y. In 1864 she moved with her parents to Oil City, Pennsylvania, where on August 15, 1866, she was married to Peter Maloney. To this union six children were born, who, with the husband, mourn the passing of one of God's ncblest women. The children are: Mrs. T. L. Heller, Quimby, Iowa; Dr. J. J. Maloney, Rock Rapids,, Iowa: Francis B. Maloney, Cherokee, Iowa; Miss Marle T. Maloney, Marshfield, Oregon; Daniel E. Maloney, Marshfield, Oregon, and Michael C. Maloney, Marshfield, Oregon.

In 1876, with her husband and family, she removed to Fort Dodge, Iowa, and later to Cherokee, Iowa, where she made her home until September, 1908, when, accompanied by her daughter, Marie, she made the trip to Coos Bay, in the hopes of benefitting her health. The change proved so beneficial that she remained here until the insidious disease that carried her off made return to her home impossible. The husband, enfeebled with years, could not make the long journey to the coast.
