Annual Meet of Coos County Association to Be Best Ever Held—To-Morrow's Card.

The annual race meet of the Coos County Racing Association will open at the Marshfield Fair Grounds track to-morrow afternoon with one of the best programs that has ever been pulled off on the local turf. The attendance also promises to be a record breaker for the meet.
