THE REAL DISRUPTERS.

THE TIMES has heretofore referred to the fact that the Assembly divided and disrupted the Republican party, and it was one of the reasons for this paper as a believer in Republican principles, opposing the Assembly. The machine manipulators propose to force factionalism on the party willy-nilly. Now comes the Harney County News, a staunchly Republican paper and advances the same views. The News says:

"The most serious mistake made by the Oregonian and its repeaters in advocacy of and apology for the assembly is the constantly asserted claim that they are the only Republicans who desire party unity and success, and that Republicans who are honestly opposed to a return to convention methods and wish to respect the letter and spirit of the primary law are endeavoring to disrupt the party and invite its defeat.

"Nothing could be farther from the truth. The rank and file of the Republicans who oppose the convention system are zealous, ardent believers in the basic principles and in the grand mission of the Republican party. Many of them have been lifelong in their adherence to it and active in the support of its candidates and its platforms when the Oregonian was knifing both with all its well-known bitter vindictiveness. They were battling for loyalty and harmony within its ranks when the Oregonian and men who are echoing its assembly rot now were sowing the seeds of discord and factionalism which have brought the only defeats suffered by the party in Oregon.

One of the noticeable advocates of the assembly through the columns of the Oregonian and Salem Statesman is a blatant talker and writer at Salem who a few years ago organized an independent movement in that city and wrested the control of the city for six years from the Republicans by a coalition with the Democrats. This same man and his immediate connections supported Chamberlain for Governor and immediately afterwards one of them was rewarded by a coveted appointment. He is a pretty sort of critic to undertake to read men out of the Republican party.

"And we could go clear along the line of prominent advocates of the Assembly idea and show that during their entire career in Oregon politics they have been treacherous to the party and its candidates whenever their personal and factional wishes were thwarted, or whenever their own personal interests stood a chance of being subserved by joining with the enemy. This same treachery will appear again the present year. Neither the Assembly ticket nor the ticket finally made up by the primary will suit the "manipulators" and they will be once again giving encouragement to Democrats and Independents and the real loyal support of the Republican ticket will come from the men who are anxious to abide by the primary law and the other laws guaranteeing the people a full and free

voice in the choice of candidates and the choice of laws.

"The same men who slaughtered Harry M. Cake at the polls in 1908 and elected Geo. Chamberlain Senator are now in control of Assembly Republicanism and they will not hesitate to repeat their revengeful tactics whenever it suits their selfish purpose. The man who insists that his own special brand of Republicanism must be accepted as genuine and that all other brands must get "the knife to the hilt" is not very reliable in the hour of battle. Oregon Republicans have had too much "knife to the hilt" already and it will take some time to restore the olive branch to its controlling place within the ranks."

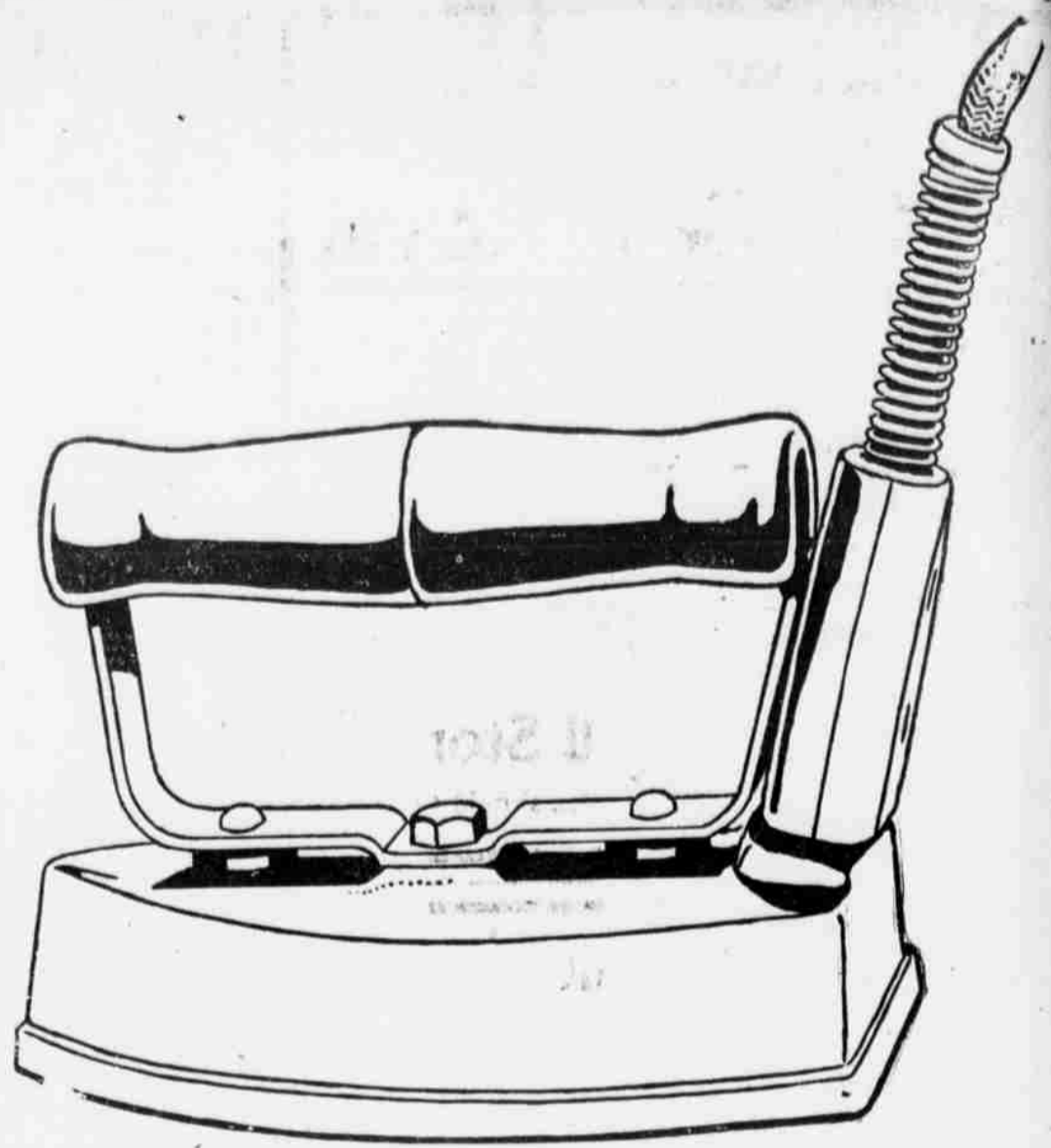
