VOTE HEAVY

Same Conditions Exist in the Entire County—Rain Has Little Effect.

The vote in Marshfield will be heavy today regardless of the wet weather. The rain does not interfere in the city but some of the politicians thought that it might make a difference in the rural districts. The voting started off well this morning and kept up lively all day.

contract. Mr. Hodgins is to be notified of this.

Councilman Allen suggested that a couple of men with carts and brooms be hired to work continuously keeping the streets clean. He said that Albany had found this system very effective.

It was suggested that maybe the city prisoners could be used for this purpose.

Mayor Straw said that he thought the residents who were doing nothing should be required to keep the streets clean. He jokingly said that he would suggest that Joe Milner, Carl Albrecht and John Golden do so.

Fourth Street Work.

Councilman Allen said that some of the owners of property near Coal Bank Slough had urged him that Fourth street be improved through the fairgrounds to the Slough and that a wharf be put in on Coal Bank Slough.

Mayor Straw and other members of the council opposed this because the plan would spoil the race track and they declared that no one would be benefited. Mayor Straw said that elevated roadways did not serve to enhance the value of the abutting low lots.

An ordinance providing for the building of the bridge and elevated roadway across the gulch on Seventh street near Glen Gardens was adopted. The bridge is now closed, being in a dangerous condition. The cost of rebuilding will be about \$1572.38.

Supt. Melvin of the Federal Construction Co. notified Mayor Straw that the company had completed its street contracts and wanted the work accepted. He was not present last night, but asked that early action be taken so that he would not be delayed here. The street committee and city attorney were instructed to examine it and if it was satisfactory to assure Mr. Melvin it would be accepted without his remaining here.

City Engineer Gidley was instructed to examine the North Broadway elevated bridge and ascertain the amount of the rebate due Mrs. Sears because the improvement had been changed from a fill to bridge work. This claim has been hanging fire for three years or more and Councilman Compe, who brought it up, said he thought it should be settled. Recorder Butler said that he did not think Mrs. Sears' rebate would be nearly as much as she expected.

For Special Policeman.

Mayor Straw informed the council that there had been so much trouble recently and so many suspicious looking strangers in town that he had put Levi Smith on as a special officer. Mr. Smith serves part of the afternoon and until 1 o'clock in the morning. The suspicious looking ones were said to be laborers coming in from near Gardiner, where they had been working for awhile on the Southern Pacific tunnel. The council did not take any action to make place for a new officer. The understanding is that the mayor would retain one as long as it was deemed necessary.

Improve Tenth Street.

A petition from some of the property owners of South Tenth street between Ingersoll and Lockhart avenues asking that the street be improved was presented. The petition was signed by C. F. Horsman, Fannie L. Reigard, G. E. Murphy and Alfred Glover. It was stated that other property owners would sign it later. A. Y. Meyers of the Reynolds Development Co. stated that if this portion of the street was improved that his company would continue the improvement on south to the county road. He said the plan was to get the preliminary work disposed of this fall and winter so that the improvement could be made next spring.

Routine Proceedings.

Contractor Moon was ordered paid \$1109 on the balance due him for grading Market avenue.

Contractor Hugh McLain was ordered paid what was coming to him on his city contracts.

A warrant for \$212.61 was ordered drawn to pay for the improvement on South Fourth street along the city's lots.

F. E. Allen reported that the committee in charge of the city hall improvements had received some bids for the work, but had not let any contract yet.

Councilman Merchant said that the Fire and Water committee had been unable to see Manager Montgomery of the Standard Oil Co. about remedying the alleged fire menace. He said that Mr. Montgomery had been out of town.

Councilman Allen said that according to reports the matter should receive immediate attention. The council adjourned for two weeks.
