Then Hoeck discovered the double payment and had Hill arrested and Justice Pennock decided it today.

MARSHFIELD IS NOT IN THE LIST

Oregon Power Company Produces Rates in Number of Oregon Cities.

The following press dispatch self-explanatory. It seems that the reduction in rates made other Oregon cities and around Marshfield should not be made the time when the general reduction and revision of rates is taking place. The following is the dispatch:

SALEM, ORE., Sept. 11.—Complaint having been made of its rate the Oregon Power Company has sent in a new schedule to the railroad commission making substantial reductions, which will be effective October 1. The rate late to lighting and power service.

The places affected are Dulles, Independence, Monmouth, Junction City, Harrisburg, Brownsville, Salem, Tangent, Halsey, Coburg, Corvallis and Philomath. Junction City and Monmouth had filed complaints with the commission and the cases are ready to be set. Announcement made by the commission that residents of the towns had indicated that the proposed rates of the company would be satisfactory.
