More Workmen.—Burt A. Doremus, of the Employment Agency, reports the arrival of twenty men on the Breakwater and also twenty-three men on the Nann Smith, all of whom will be employed by Willett & Burr on the Smith-Powers railroad construction work near Myrtle Point.
