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IRISH TROUBLE IS SPREADING

Government Admits Feeling is Bad in South and West of Country ONE HUNDRED DEAD Part of Dublin Reported in Flames and Street Battle Continues LOYAL PEOPLE SHOT DOWN

Much Looting Going on But Reinforced Military Said to Be Making Progress—Communication Cut Off and Details Are Lacking

LONDON, April 29.—Parts of the city of Dublin are in flames, the Evening News dispatch filed at Belfast last night says street fighting continues and there is much looting. It is said, but reinforced military is making general progress. Most of the shops are closed and passenger communication is cut off.

Using Artillery One dispatch received from Ireland this afternoon says that Sackville and Crafts streets in Dublin are in flames and that the artillery is being used on the houses, the inhabitants having been removed.

Details Are Lacking Although the story of the early hours of the Dublin uprising now disclosed in considerable detail, England is still without authentic information as to the progress of later events. Of the situation outside of Dublin little is known beyond the official admission that the disaffection has spread to the various localities in the west and south of Ireland.

One Hundred Killed The Evening News correspondent says upward of one hundred persons have been killed or injured in Dublin. It says the rioters, hidden in houses commanding the important street junctions or covered by barricades in the streets, are keeping up a constant fusillade.

Rebels Have Arms The thing that surprised me most about the uprising in Dublin is the supply of munitions in the hands of the rebels," said an arrival from Ireland today. He spent ten hours in Dublin Tuesday.

Killed a Guard "I heard that the Countess Markievicz, sister of an Irish baron, who is a leading figure in the present movement, shot dead a guard in front of the Dublin castle in an effort to capture the castle. The effort failed."

FIGHT FOR THEIR LIVES DUBLIN, April 27.—(Delayed.)—Fifteen hundred or so armed men of the Sinn Fein had a hold on Ireland's capital today. After four hours fighting their rebel flag still flew from a number of central points.

DECLARE LOCKOUT

ACTION TAKEN BY CLOAK, SUIT AND SKIRT FACTORIES Strike of 70,000 Employees Is Threatened Unless An Agreement Is Reached Soon

NEW YORK, April 29.—A lockout throwing 35,000 garment making employes out of work in more than 400 shops was declared in effect today by the Cloak, Suit and Skirt Manufacturing Association.

Unless an agreement is reached within 48 hours, it was stated by the employes there will be a strike of 70,000 workers. Employers denied the lockout was caused by a demand for a closed shop.

RAIN AGAIN DISRUPTS THE SERIES IN PORTLAND Snow Comes Down in Boston and Puts Halt to Struggle—Issue Rain Checks in Snow Storm

PORTLAND, April 29.—Major General Townshend, commander of the British forces besieged at Kut-El-Amara, Mesopotamia, by the Turkish forces since last December, has surrendered. This information is contained in a British official statement issued this afternoon.

British Commander of Forces at Kut-El-Amara Has Given Up

ANNOUNCEMENT IS MADE The Information Is Contained In An Official English Statement Which Is Given Out Today In London

Nearly 9,000 Men The force under him consists of 2,970 British troops of all ranks and service and some 6,000 Indian troops and their followers.

Relief Army Near Less than a score of miles away on the banks of the Tigris below the city is a relief army which for months has been attempting to reach the beleaguered force of Townshend.

Losses Were Big The unofficial number in the expedition is estimated at 50,000, but is probably smaller. This force suffered severe losses in the heavy battles with the Turks.

First Surrender It was later announced that the garrison was composed of 2,970 English, and 6,000 Indian troops. It has been closely besieged for 140 days.

In Serious Danger The Kut-El-Amara garrison is believed to have been in serious danger for several days because of lack of food. Officials made no attempt to minimize the gravity of Townshend's position.

Floods Interfere Floods blocked the relief forces, now twenty-three miles east of the city. The trapping of Townshend occurred after the Baghdad campaign collapsed.

LEADERS MEET

Funston and Scott Prepare for Conference About Military Situation in Mexico

Preliminary Calls Are Made by Representatives of Two Governments

Mexican War Minister Is Met at International Bridge by United States Cavalry and Escorted to General Scott's Private Car

WILL MEET IN SECRET THIS AFTERNOON

EL PASO, Texas, April 29.—The first formal conference between Obregon and Scott will be held this afternoon. The meeting place is a secret. Captain Lee, of Scott's staff announced.

EL PASO, Texas, April 29.—General Obregon, minister of war of the defacto government with the chief military commanders of northern Mexico, made a return call of courtesy today upon Generals Scott and Funston, preliminary to the first conference between the American and Mexican officials that is largely to determine the future course of the military army of the United States that has thrust itself into Mexico.

The American generals made the first call on Obregon yesterday.

General Obregon and party were met at the international bridge by a troop of the American cavalry, which escorted them through the thronged streets, guarded with the infantry, to the railroad station, where on Scott's private car the Mexican officials were welcomed.

Plans Are Discussed The call was of some length and plans for the first conference were discussed. It is understood the conference may not be held until tomorrow or Monday.

CAPTURE RUSSIANS

FIFTY SIX HUNDRED MADE PRISONERS BY GERMANS

Number Includes Officers and Four Staff Members—Equipment Also Seized

BERLIN, April 29.—More than fifty-six hundred Russians including high officers, were captured when the Germans carried positions between Stanaroz and Stachere, it is officially announced.

The Russians suffered heavily. Counter attacks were repulsed. Fifty-six officers, including four staff members, one cannon, ten mine throwers and twenty-eight machine guns were seized.

OBJECTS TO ACTION

J. HENNESSY MURPHY RESIGNS FROM HIBERNIANS
