"The thing that surprised me most about the uprising in Dublin is the supply of munitions in the hands of the rabels," said an arrival from Ireland today. He spent ten hours in Dublin Tuesday.

"There is little doubt in the popnlar mind that the Germans have been landing arms from submarines for months," he continued, "and it even is said-though I don't believe t-that a few Germans also landed lines. and organized.


