## HOLD TRACK MEET

MAY 20 IS DATE SET FOR GRADES SCHOOL COMPETITIONS

Boys To Be Divided Into Three Classes—Albert Johnson Heads Swimming Roll

May 20 the boys of the schools from the fourth to the eighth grades will hold a track meet at the race track on south Fourth street. Arrangements for this are now being made under the direction of F. L. Grannis, physical instructor.

To meet the ages of the youngsters there will be three classes, A, B and C with special events in each class.

In the A class will be the following events, 75 yard dash, running high jump, broad jump, javelin throw and the 880 yard relay.

In the B class are both the jumps, the 75 yard dash and a 440 yard relay while in Class B is scheduled the 50 yard dash, broad and high jumps and a 220 yard relay.

### Is Prize Swimmer

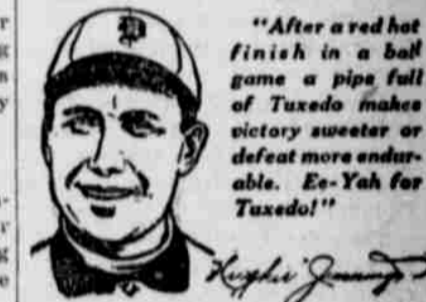
