It cannot help but be injurious to a ow to milk her up to a new calving. It is exhausting to the cow and the calf both, as the calf is supported by the cow and needs the nutriment that is taken from the cow in the milk. A cow should be dried off four weeks before the calf is due, and this is more desirable because the milk itself is undergoing a change during this time by which it is made un-fit for use in the dairy and unpleasant for food. To dry a cow leave half the milk in the udder, and continue this for a week; then milk once a day only, and till leave some of the milk; feed only dry food, and if necessary, straw; but give meal in moderate quantity. If the cow is one of those occasional profuse milkers that cannot be dried, the milk may be fed to pigs and the cow milked partly.
