California courts have decided that if Mrs. Botkin is tried for the Delaware murder it will be in California.

The Dalles is full of thugs. Toledo has none; which shows the difference in morals of two of Oregon's best towns.

The French Monday ordered four battalions of infantry, 1,500 marines and 600 artillerymen to Toulon. England is ready for the worst.

S. L. Kline of Corvallis, purchased nine car loads of prunes in 48 hours a few days since. They will be repacked in Portland and shipped East.

The governor has accepted Senator Simon's resignation and ordered a special election in Multnomah county November 15 to fill his place.

The actual debt of Douglas county, as shown by the report of the officials on September 30th is \$104,390.84. One year ago it was \$126,104.44, a reduction of \$21,713.60.

Douglas is the banner prune growing county of Oregon by a large majority, the dried output aggregating this season probably not less than 2,500,000 pounds or 100 carloads.

The supreme court of United States has decided that the railroad combination made by thirty one roads in the United States and known as the Grand Trunk combine, is a trust and therefore unlawful.

Judge Houser, of the Skagit county supreme court, has handed down an opinion which debars the nominees of the independent convention held at Burlington a few weeks ago from being placed upon the official ticket. The decision follows that of the attorney-general of the state, to the effect that any independent or other than the regularly constituted conventions must nominate a complete ticket, or none of the names of the nominees can be placed upon the official ticket. In the case of the convention which assembled at Burlington, it merely nominated a partial county ticket, omitting the congressional ticket and state supreme court ticket altogether, hence the bar.
