COUNTY NEWS.

Mr. Shepherd is a young man of untiring energy, good ability as a writer and especially so as a fair minded chronicler of local events and one who is willing to work and anxious to improve the county through the influence of his columns, and as such deserves the undivided support of the people of Grant County.

For some reason unknown to us, Grant County has no heretofore been considered a first class location for a county news paper. We hope however, that Mr. Shepherd will succeed in rallying the people to his support, and we would advise the people of that, as well as all other counties of Eastern Oregon, to sustain their county paper if in so doing, they are compelled to discontinue taking all others.

A unusual interest was taken in the Quarterly Meeting held in this City on last Saturday and Sunday. Rev. Granis delivered a thorough discourse on Saturday evening to a crowded house. At eleven o'clock on Sunday the Presiding Elder preached a very logical discourse, after which Rev. Hawn administered the holy rites of baptism on Henry Frederick Homburger and Leon Lewis Shepherd. A collection was taken up and the dropping of coin into the hat was like unto the "rattle of the soft rain overhead." Miss Douthitt is his assistant, and is a good teacher, and is well liked by all of her pupils. The school at this place is considered one of the best in Eastern Oregon; and why shouldn't it be; people can send their children to school in Canyon City without exposing them to that dreaded disease diphtheria.

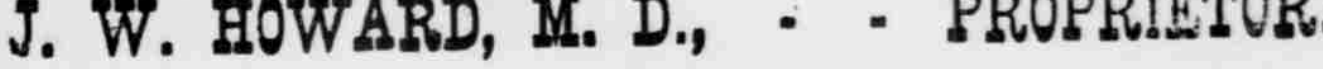
