FREIGHT BUSINESS.—We have taken the pains to go to a majority of the business men in this city and ascertain as near as possible the number of pounds of freight they received during the year, and in the aggregate have the following amount: 1,024,291 add to the above 70,000 received by the John Daytown business men, 830,000 to the Chinese here and at lowertown 400,000 for the Prairie City folks, 90,000 for Robisonville, Susanville and Spanish Gulch and 200,000 for Stevens and Snider, at Harney, and we have received in this county during the year 2,214,291 lbs. of freight and say nothing of Camp Harney Post nor Malheur Agency, which would add at least 300,000 more. Kam Wau Chung, of John Daytown, paid to the O. S. N. Co., last month, a few dollars over \$400 for river transportation. They are perhaps the heaviest shippers in this Valley.

WAS IT INDIANS?—A few weeks ago while one of our freighters was going up Birch creek hill, a friend of his who was ahead turned his horse and rode back meeting the freight man upon the steepest pitch on the hill and told him that Indians were ahead, whereupon the teamster turned his ten horse team and three wagons and made stage time down said hill. NEW CLAIMS.—Mr. John Herburger informs us that he has sold to the Chinamen 400 feet square of mining ground on his farm 4 1/2 miles from this city, for three thousand dollars, and gives them the privilege of using one acre for the purpose of prospecting. They will go to work upon the claims next week.
