### Sheriff's Posse in Harney Valley.

FORT HARNEY OGN; Sept 15, '79. EDITOR NEWS; -A horse thief and desperate character, was shot and instantly killed on the Winnemacca road, 20 miles south of this place early yesterday morning. The facts in connection with the affair are as follows: -Anderson and Chas. Hamblin, Dept. sheriffs of Umatilla county, arrived here Saturday evening, having in their possession a warrant for the arrest of two men who stole horses at Heppner, Umatilla county, upon making inquir ies at the Post they learned that the men they were looking for were on the Winnemucea road traveling south, and would probably camp at the Slough, 16 miles from here, that night. After started in hot pursuit of the fugitives. accompained by W. W. Johnson and Byron Gr ham of this place. The party traveled all night and at daylight yesterday morning they overtook them at a point in the Winnemucca his line to call and see him. road opposite Saddle Butte and about 20 miles south of Fort Harney.
