NEW LAWS NOW IN EFFECT.

Twelve of Those Voted on June 1 Must be Obedied.

The Portland Journal says: People of the state may not realize it, but they have passed 12 new laws to obey since June 1, when the governor's proclamation put into force the constitutional amendments and initiative and referendum laws considered favorably by the people at the recent election of June 1.

Taking them in the order that they were promulgated by the secretary of state, it will be seen that the time for holding the general election will not be the first Tuesday after the first Monday in June. Consequently the next general election will be held on November of 1910.

Under the provisions of the provisions' feeling all drafted, and enacted by the legislature primarily for the benefit of Sheriff Stephens of Multnomah county, all sheriffs in Oregon are now the custodians and guardians of the prisoners in their jails. In Multnomah county also the sheriff is allowed 12 cents a month for food furnished to the prisoners.

By virtue of a same vote of the people the University of Oregon is said in its appropriation of \$125,000 for 1907 and of the same amount for each year thereafter.

The most peculiar situation in the law has been caused by the passage of the two fish bills, one drafted by the legislature and the other by the Columbia with the intention of putting the upper river fishermen and the business community as provided, and the other drafted by the legislature with the same intent towards the lower river men.

For the past 20 years the fishing season interests of the Columbia river have been trying to get successive legislatures to regulate the salmon fishing of the river, each with the intention of putting the other out of business.

The legislature have been held in check on such legislation, and for the most part have taken no action. This year, however, the legislature have been pushed by the people, and effectively regulating the salmon fishing on the entire coast between its mouth and The Dalles. A big fight is promised as a result of the passage of the two bills. It is expected that the upper river fishermen will keep themselves open for violations of their law regarding the fishing on the lower river. It is now expected that all parties will take the stream in a daily manner. The stream will be restored to the state, which are disgruntled over the failure to carry out the law. Public interest is on edge waiting to see which part of the state the result will strike first.

The statute instructing the members of the legislature to vote for that United States Senatorial candidate who receives the highest number of votes at the general election is also a law. It will not be binding upon the members of the legislature elected in June last, though it is perhaps a fact that the members of the house elected from Clackamas county are now in effect doubly bound.

Early in the last campaign practically all of the Clackamas county candidates for the legislature pledged themselves to abide by the provisions of the law should it be passed. Later they changed their pledges to a straight subscription to statement No. 1. With the passage of the law, however, it would appear that the Clackamas county members are under double bonds.

The proportional representation amendment is now in effect, and is not effective. The amendment provides for proportional representation, but leaves the legislature to wrestle with the manner of securing such representation.

It is contemplated by the amendment that the legislature by statute should provide a way of securing such representation. It will be up to the next legislature, therefore, to enact a law putting into effect the constitutional amendment.

Clark Taber, Red Boy Mining Man Passed Away.

A telegram received in this city yesterday announced the death of Mr. Clark Taber in Portland at 7 o'clock the evening previous and the news passed from one friend of the deceased to another. Expressions of sorrow were heard on every hand in Clark's home and he had been impressed with all his many friends of scores of years in this community by his lasting friendship and loyalty that will go into eternity.
