RECIPROCITY IS

ING DOMINION MINOTION SULT WILL BE TO MAKE OF MAR RECIPROGAL CAUSE FOR MANT TEARS TO COME.

(Journal Special Service.)

Montreal, Oct. 17.—Much that is of victal consequence to the United States as well as Canada hangs upon the issue of the pending Dominion election. At a time when Republicans and Democrats in the United States are both urging the importance of closer trade relations between the two countries, Americans cannot remain indifferent to a political contest, the result of which will be to make or mar the cause of reciprocity for many years to come.

Reciprocity does not appear upon the surface of each of the two political platforms in Canada, yet it is safe to say that the Liberals, while in no sense eager for a reciprocity treaty with the United States are fully prepared at any time to consider favorably any suggestion from the Washington government looking toward closer and more equitable trade relations between the two countries; and it is equally certain that should the Conservatives be returned to power reciprocity would be an impossibility, the policy of the Conservative party pointing rather toward a raising of the tariff against the United States

power reciprocity would be an impossibility, the policy of the Conservative
party pointing rather toward a raising
of the tariff against the United States
than to a reciprocal lowering of duties
on both sides of the boundary.

A great deal of misconception has
arisen as to the probable effect of preferential trade between Canada and the
United States if the former were first to
be established, and vice versa if a
treaty of reciprocity were first arranged.

It has been assumed that two policies
were irreconcilable, but this is not the
case. Broadminded Canadian public
men look forward to the day when Canada's trade relations will be mutually
satisfactory both with the United States
and Great Britain. So far as reciprocity
is concerned, it is evident that this
can only be brought about by reasonable
concessions on both sides in the direction of a lowering or wiping out of the
duties on certain commodities, and this
is now fully realized by public men on
both sides of the international boundary.
