

CINNABAR STRIKE NEAR BONEVILLE

C. A. Patterson's Property Said to Have Thirty-Seven-Foot Vein in the Adit.

NEEDS A FURNACE FOR THE DRIFT HEADINGS

Very Rich Cross-cut of Nearly Five Hundred Feet Entered Large Vein.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Friverville, Dec. 5.—Recent developments in the mercury deposits 28 miles east of this city have been of an exceptionally favorable nature in the past few weeks. C. A. Patterson of Portland, who has been prospecting for cinnabar in this district, has come in from the property he is working and says that the main tunnel he has been driving has attained a length of 450 feet, and that the present face of it is in a magnificent vein of quicksilver, work done until the present showing it to have a width of 37 feet. In the course of this tunnel several smaller veins were encountered, but none of them had such ore as that being opened in this vein.

PLANS TO REOPEN THE CRYSTAL CON. MINES

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Cottleville, Dec. 5.—L. E. Snapp of Baltimore, one of the stockholders of the Crystal Consolidated Mining company, has been here during the week. He visited the company's property in Bohemia and was gratified at the showing made with the money expended. On his return here a meeting was held, and Mr. Lloyd, president of the company, says that plans were contemplated to reopen the mine and place the company on a sound financial basis, which plans will materialize as soon as Mr. Snapp can return to Baltimore. A critical stage in the affairs of the company last summer the new mill was nearly completed and development progressing, many of the stockholders in the company who dwell in Baltimore had placed their business in the hands of a trustee and shortly afterward the mine closed. The company's financial rehabilitation is assured in a few days, and Mr. Lloyd says the assessment work on the seven acreage claims on the Noonday ridge and in the Champion canyon will be immediately begun, and a force of men put at work on the main group upon which stands the new mill. The tunnel on the big lead will be extended all winter, while the finishing touches to the mill will be taken up in the early spring.

HIGH GRADE ORE FROM MAYFLOW TUNNELS

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Baker City, Dec. 5.—Foreman J. A. Wilson of the Mayflower mine, in the Cornucopia district, adjoining the Searies prospect, has arrived in the city with fifty tons of ore from the lowest level recently uncovered, and a number of sacks of concentrates from the mill test. The concentrates were from the low grade ore, but are said to assay 1250. The ore is being crushed in the Noonday mill, and samples is said to run from 1500 to 2000 to the ton. The ore has been turned over to the Sumpter smelter, with whom a contract has been made for the future product of the mine.

RICH SURFACE ORES FROM ALASKA CLAIMS

Lewiston, Idaho, Dec. 5.—Louis Dahl recently received a check from the Tacoma smelter for \$74.47, which represents his share of a shipment of 366 pounds of ore, after \$8 treatment charges had been deducted. The ore came from the claims Mr. Dahl recently purchased at the head of Bangard creek 17 miles from Nome City, Alaska, for himself, Frank Brown and Chris Olsen. There is no work on the claims, the 366 pounds of ore having come from the surface.

EASTERN ENGINEER BECAME INTERESTED

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Cottleville, Dec. 5.—Dr. M. Schumann, mining engineer and mineralogist, has returned from a month's examination of the mineral deposits of Bohemia district. This was his second visit to the district in the past three months. His impressions were so favorable on the first that he determined to look the camp over more thoroughly. He is convinced of the future possibilities of the district, and says if the oxide ore is properly handled the mineral is so extensive that not only will capital be handsomely rewarded, but ample wealth will be secured for the deep exploitation of the sulphide deposits. He finds that in the main Bohemia ore resemble the mineral of the camps of Colorado, with more oxidation at the surface in Bohemia. Business interests call Dr. Schumann to Butte, Mont., at present, but he says he will return home in about six weeks, and it is not unlikely that he will acquire permanent interests in the district.

HUMP DISTRICT HAS A PROSPEROUS SEASON

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Spokane, Wash., Dec. 5.—R. L. Campbell is from Buffalo Wagon, where he has been working on his group of claims near the Granite property. He says the season has been a prosperous one, and that the mine is in excellent shape, and that two veins have been crossed in driving a working adit. One is six feet wide, and the other three feet wide. The ore bodies are containing small but rich veins of silver. The crosscut tunnel is being continued to tap the Monte Cristo vein.

SMELTER ORDERED FOR A KELLER MINE

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Spokane, Wash., Dec. 5.—R. L. Boyd, president of the Keller & Indiana Consolidated Smelting company, has arrived from the east. Before leaving there he purchased a 150-ton smelter, a sampling plant, a turbine water wheel and an electric plant, all of which will be shipped to Williams and handed to the plant in running order in less than a year.

SMELTER AT MINERAL HAS BEEN RENOVATED

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Baker City, Or., Dec. 5.—George M. McDowell, representing the Charles E. Lead interests in the Mineral City and Snake river mining company, has arrived in Baker City yesterday. At Mineral City he says the smelter, which has been rebuilt and is now complete with the exception of the new jacket for the furnaces, is capable of handling 110 tons of ore a day, and that 2,000 tons of ore are stored for treatment. Enough ore is blocked out to keep the smelter busy for two years. It is expected to be started in operation within a few weeks and Mr. McDowell is confident that railroad connections will soon be made for the Snake river country.

GOLDEN RULE BUSY.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Cottage Grove, Or., Dec. 5.—William Wechter, president of the Golden Rule company, returned here today after a week's visit to the company's holdings. He says that ample supplies have arrived at the property for the winter and he has mapped out winter work. The Robinson tunnel, now 216 feet on the vein, will be steadily driven from the surface of the vein-matter now in the face the management expects to encounter the pay shoot soon. George W. Wechter, one of the owners, who has been continually on the ground for 18 months, has been relieved of his stewardship, and came out with his wife for the winter. They will visit California.

ORE FROM JUDSON ROCK.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Cottage Grove, Or., Dec. 5.—Under the management of A. D. LeRoy work is going briskly forward on the Judson Rock property. Three new tunnels have been started on different ledges, one of which Mr. LeRoy says already shows seven feet of quartz of good average value. The Judson Rock group is situated below the ore line and work can be prosecuted the year around. If results justify, and the development thus far are said to do so, the company expects to keep up continuous development.

FABRICS GOOD WORK.
