In the melee Mrs. Loftus declared that her spouse attempted to cut her with a pocket knife and in self-defense she slashed him on the arm with a butcher knife.

BUILD COOS BAY ELECTRIC LINE

Hewitt, Simpson & Bell Will Also Construct a Gas Plant There. PORTLAND LOSES BY WANT OF STEAMERS Service Between This City and Marshfield, North Bend and Other Points Inadequate to Trade Willing to Come This Way.

Construction of an electric railway, a large electric light and power plant and a gas plant at Coos Bay will be commenced by Hewitt, Simpson & Bell, as soon as spring opens.

Henry Hewitt, who was formerly principal owner of the St. Paul & Tacoma Lumber company and recently sold his interests, is owner of very large timber and other property interests on the coast.

Mr. Hewitt was in Portland today on the way to Drains, where he will take the stage route to Coos Bay. Regarding the intentions of his Coos Bay syndicate he said:

"Yes, we intend to build the electric line, and it will connect North Bend, Marshfield and Empire. We have a franchise from the town of North Bend, and have been promised one by Marshfield. We have taken over the electric light plant owned by Mr. Simpson and will develop it and also build a gas plant. We are now supplying electric arc lights cheaper than Portland gets them, and our rate on incandescents is 25 per cent less than the Portland rate, although we have to use steam power altogether.

"Why doesn't Portland get in and give a decent steamship service between this city and Coos Bay? There are nothing but old tubs now running on this coast, and we who travel between Portland and coast points would rather go through the mud by the stage line than travel on the present boats.

"The city of Portland ought to get a move on itself and do something in a practical way to cultivate the Coos Bay trade. Good boat lines are the first necessity. The people of Coos Bay feel that now, since Portland has got what it wanted from the government to build the Columbia river jetty, this city ought to furnish a first-class steamship service to encourage the business of the coast points. The trade is there, and it would favor Portland if reasonable transportation facilities were given."

AMATEUR MUSICIANS ARE WELL RECEIVED Spitzner Philharmonic Society Gives Successful Recital at the Heilig.

The annual concert of the Spitzner Philharmonic society stands by itself among the musical events of the year. The other soloists were Miss Cassie Hiller, Master Philip Kamm and James Woodcock, and all acquitted themselves creditably.
