The Scio Colonists.

A. W. Lang, business manager of the Scio colony, speaking to a representative of the Silverton Appeal of the proposed methods of the colony, says that there will be about 200 families or about 1000 people in all, who will come from the Eastern states and settle on the tract of land two and one-half miles from Scio, in Linn county.

Mr. Lang has just completed the survey of the land. The company owns 16 1/2 miles square of level farming land, almost all in cultivation.

Each family will be allotted a certain portion of the land to cultivate. The company will operate two large sawmills of their own, to furnish lumber for building purposes.
