

There is no spurious glorification in redeeming it. It rather suits the Government to keep its currency floating. We are very particular in sending coin abroad to the rich bankers in London and Frankfort for their interest, but nobody seems to care how much the poor emigrant has to pay in exchange when he makes a remittance to his old parents at home. The Administration has taken no steps to restore specie payments.

Rags snit its policy better. We are aware too, that "thes people" have a great scheme for funding the debt at a lower rate of interest, by which the burthen of the annual interest was to be ever so much lightened. To effect this, every sort of machinery has been set in motion. Europe fairly bristles with our agencies; and the result is-absolute failure.
