Wheat—For the ordinary shipping \$1 02 1/2 is bid and on Saturday some sold at this. It is a figure that will buy little just now. For valley shippers value \$1 12 1/2 but there is no business doing.

In Salem much wheat is coming in. On Friday, as we go press, warehouse men paid 70c per bushel, whereupon the Salem Flouring Mills Company immediately advanced prices to 72 1/2c, which is more than the market warrants, where figured on the basis of quotations in Liverpool, with wheat at \$1.35 per cental in San Francisco, wheat is only worth 56c in Salem.

Oats—Buyers and sellers of new are apart and there is next to nothing done. New choice grey sold out at 43c.

Potatoes—Oregon about 1c. California sell at \$1 to 1 10. Sweets 3c.

Onions—Selling at \$1 10 to 1 25. Chickens—Young sell at \$2 50 to 3 and old at \$4 50 to 5 50. These prices will probably be soon shaded.

Eggs—Receipts not largely but the request is small and market easy at 18 to 20c, the bulk of sales being at 18c.

Dried fruit bears the following prices: Sun dried quartered apples 8@9c, sliced 10c. factory 11@12c. prunes 16@12c. French do 10c. graded do 10@12c. pitted plums nominally 11 to 12c. peaches 14 to 15c. grapes 5 1/2 to 6c. raisins \$2.

The Price of Wheat.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 22.—The call board opened this morning for the first time since the collapse of the wheat deal three weeks ago. When the board closed the price of wheat, seller 1887, was \$2 17 1/2 per cental, and buyer the season was \$2 10. The first sale of buyer the season this morning was \$1 60 and then dropped to \$1 59 1/2. \$1 37 was the only bid made for seller '87, which was offered at \$1 50. Not a single transaction took place, but the brokers are relieved from the change, and satisfied that the step had been taken and the market bed-rocked so easily.

Mark Lane Review.

LONDON, Aug. 22.—The Mark Lane Express, in its review of the British grain trade during the past week, says: The rainfall has checked the shipping and delivery of wheat, and consequently has arrested the downward course of prices, although values in London and in some provincial markets, have continued in favor of buyers. Estimates based on the government's acreage of the crops for 1877, place the new yield of wheat at about 6,250,000, quarters after deducting 600,000 quarters for seed. The foreign wheat trade is devoid of feature. Russian and American samples are competing at the lowest rates.

Wool, Salmon and Hops

NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—The wool market remains unchanged, and sellers see no opportunity for higher rates. Among sales were 1000 pounds of burry California at fourteen cents.

The Philadelphia market shows no improvement, manufacturers being willing to invest only when concessions are made. Among sales were 1000 pounds of scoured California at 52 1/2 cents, 1000 pounds Montana medium at 25 cents, 25,000 pounds Washington territory coarse at 17 cents, 1000 pounds Territory medium at 22 cents, 10,000 pounds Territory medium at 22 cents.

The Boston market is active and strong, but prices are no higher. Among the sales were 132,000 pounds California spring and Oregon at 10 cents, and 54,700 pounds territory at 19 to 26 cents.

In the line of canned goods Columbia salmon is in demand at \$2, with spot stock difficult to obtain.

There is no change in the hop market. The English crop outlook is improved by recent rains. Coast crop of 1886, best, 16 to 18 cents; same, good to common, 13 to 15 cents; 1885, good to prime, 8 to 10 cents.

New Methods of Strawberry Propagation.

A Tuscarawas county, Ohio, fruit grower adopts the following method for rapidly increasing his stocks of plants of high-priced varieties. As runners get to root the help pass along the rows, cut off all the young tips and drop them into a pail of water. The cuttings are then planted in rows 3 1-2 feet by 18 inches, watered and shaded for a day or two, when they grow more readily than young plants with tender milky roots. Half an acre planted in this way last year was in fruiting this year, the best of any out of four acres planted last year. Another method is to place the plants close together in a cold frame, shade and water a few days, when they will at once make roots and become fit for summer planting. New tips will be rapidly thrown out from the parent plants, which in the same way can be cut into water and bedded out from time to time with a wonderful increase. From 1200 to 1500 plants have been propagated from one stock plant in a single season. This same method is also being tested on raspberries that root from the tip with promise, as there need be no loss from drought or by being blown away by the winds. The tips should be cut when they begin to ripen by turning a reddish brown at the ends. After these are cut off the plants will oftentimes throw out lateral tips for field propagation later.—J. H. Hale, in Farm and Home.
