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DEFEATING THEMSELVES.

Two or three persons in Pendleton, who are supplying the two Republican campaign sheets with their material, announce that they have some new slanders in preparation. No doubt of it. There is nothing too false or vile, or contemptible, for these fellows to invent. They have probably given up the vain attempt to defeat the democratic candidates, and are devoting themselves exclusively now to the East Oregonian and its editor, whom they hate with the malignity of demons. The success and influence of this paper excite in them the fiercest jealousy and rage, and anything, everything, that can by any possibility lessen that success or influence, they will not hesitate to employ. But their efforts will be unavailing.

We know who it is in Pendleton who is supplying the Weston self-out sheet with its material. It is sufficient to say that it is a man whose name, if it were appended to the stuff of which he is the author, would be a sufficient brand of falsehood and slander, a man who could not find one man out of a hundred among his acquaintances who would believe him under oath, a man who, if he were a candidate for any office in this county, would be beaten a thousand votes by any man upon the Democratic ticket. This is the source of Ridenour & Baker's campaign material.

It is strange that these persons learn nothing. Two years ago they tried the same sort of plan—wholesale falsehood and slander—and did not elect a man to any importance in the county. It will turn out about the same way again.

NO HELP FROM WASHINGTON. Mr. A. Bush, chairman of the Democratic State Central Committee, writes as follows to the Oregonian:

"Please give me space to say that the dispatches repeatedly published in the Oregonian to the effect that the Washington administration is causing money to be sent to Oregon to be used in our pending election, are untrue. If President Cleveland and his administration are taking interest in our election, the Democratic State committee has not been made aware of it. With the exception of \$28 from a California fund that committee has received no assistance from outside the State, and very little inside."

The Oregonian persists in "shrewdly suspecting" that money is being distributed quietly by confidential agents, without the knowledge of prominent Democrats. Of course the Oregonian has not a particle of evidence that such is the case. It only supposes that Democrats will necessarily follow Republican example. The fact is that the Democratic authorities at Washington have not taken the interest in Oregon that they should have done. The truth in regard to the tariff ought to be placed in the hands of every voter in the State, it has not been done.

GOVERNOR STEVENSON, of Idaho, lately pardoned a man from the penitentiary "upon the express and positive condition that he said W. B. Johnson shall hereafter in all respects demean himself as an orderly and law-abiding citizen; that he shall abstain from any kind of intoxicating liquors as a beverage, and that he shall not be a frequenter of saloons and gambling houses; and it is provided that upon the violation of the conditions imposed upon him the Governor of the Territory of Idaho may summarily revoke the pardon and by his warrant order and direct the said person so pardoned to be subjected to the full performance of the sentence."

Our dispatches yesterday announced the probable return of Henry Villard to power in Northwestern railroad matters. A more detailed statement is that for some time past a syndicate has been quietly working to obtain control of the stock of this company. It is claimed that out of the total stock issued, 400,000

shares, the syndicate holds fully 300,000 shares. Sydney Dillon, the present president, will retire, but will be retained by the board of directors in Villard's interest, as will also W. S. Bull. It is also said that Mr. Villard has arranged to take care of the floating debt of \$3,000,000 which has hung over the property as a perennial menace, and that financially all will move smoothly. It is estimated that the Villard party has also succeeded in obtaining a majority of the stock of the Oregon Railway & Navigation Company, and that at the election it will pass into the control of Mr. Villard.

Mr. RAMSEY's election is assured. Of this the slanderers may rest assured. It is only a question of his majority. If they keep up their persecution to the utmost of their inventive ability, it will be the largest ever given to a man in the district. As it is, it is safe to say it will be at least 500 or 600 in the district. And if Mr. Leasure's two campaign sheets can succeed in circulating their slanderous persecutions quite thoroughly, it will be 1,000. Mr. Fee is a decent and agreeable young man, but he is very unfortunate in having such "fool friends."

HOW IT WORKS.

PENDLETON, OR., May 18, 1888. To the Editor of the East Oregonian. If we believe our Republican friends a high protective tariff will make us all rich. Let us illustrate how it works. A farmer having fenced in his land, finds that a band of sheep consumes all the grass around him. He goes to the herder, and requests him to leave enough pasture for the cow, but the herder says: "This is government land," and he stays. Besides he will tax the farmer the value of ten acres of his wheat, on the woodens he wears. Our manufacturers, by reason of the high tariff, cannot compete in foreign countries with England, and the profits upon the home consumption are so large that over-production results. To get rid of this over-production they are sent out on the road, each one of whom counting traveling expenses, takes at least \$50,000 a year, or a total of \$325,000,000 a year paid to drummers. The farmer is encouraged and urged to buy, upon credit, and when the money comes due crops have perhaps failed, and he has to borrow of Eastern capitalists, giving a mortgage on his farm. The farmer has to work fourteen hours a day to make both ends meet. In the Western States the farm mortgages aggregate four thousand million dollars, beside all other indebtedness, and they are good Republican States too. Altogether the protective tariff swindle and our 60,000 lawyers cost this country more than the entire armies and navies of the whole of Europe combined. J. H.
