### A SIGHTLESS PAIR OF EYES.

An editorial writer on the Oregonian talks about Cleveland as if he had a personal grudge against the President, not as if he wrote from any knowledge or observation of him. No one but a sapheaded, vindictive, revengeful soul could say so much which contained so little sense, decency or truth. Whoever the writer is, he is a coward, common in taste, rotten in character, and damnable in thought and action. Cleveland is a honesty, as everybody knows, who has any knowledge of the man, and a grain of sense on which to base the knowledge. No man could have done more or performed it better than Cleveland has accomplished in the Presidential chair, under the same conditions. The sapheads who sit around and croak prove the assertion by the extent of their own progress in life. That the name of Cleveland will live even after he is dead, in history, there is not the least doubt, and it deserves to live. There is life in rugged honesty and determination to perform what is best for the people, regardless of Special Scenery, what is most popular. A life based on what is seemingly plausible, demagoguery, popularity, clap-trap corruption, untruth, this is the life of a politician, but one based on truth, decency, high aim, the good of the many, the destruction of issues, the purposes of which are robbery, even if following these paths bring failure in the life of a statesman, a MAN, the noblest work of God.
