GENERAL NEWS.

It is "officially" announced that Minister Conger will be home from China before election if he can get here and will make a few speeches for McKinley.

The directors of the Iowa Central Railway company have passed the half year's dividend on the preferred stock.

The extremely heavy rainfall in all parts of Iowa in the last four days of last week is a serious menace to crops.

The government is arranging to relieve Lord Roberts in South Africa, deposing a general of less consequence the vacation of his post.

ROLAND QUINTEN, accused of embezzling from \$25,000 and \$30,000 in St. Louis several years ago, was arrested in Portland Thursday and will be taken back to St. Louis.

THE YOUNG WOMAN who came to Portland as the supposed wife of Dixon, the defunct partner of Seattle, Mrs. Frederick Cameron, of Seattle, she ran away with Dixon during the absence from home of her husband on a business trip.

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EMPRESS AND EMPEROR FLY

Hurriedly Took Their Departure From Peking at Approach of Allies.

JAPANESE CAVALRY ARE IN PURSUIT Seven American Marines Were Killed and Two Wounded During the Siege—All Are Well Except One Child.

London, Aug. 20.—The Chinese minister here received a dispatch from Peking saying the empress dowager and the emperor left Peking a few days before the allies arrived there.

Japanese Cavalry in Pursuit. The Japanese cavalry has left Peking in pursuit of the dowager empress, according to the telegrams from the north received at Shanghai by Chinese officials.

Berlin, August 20.—The foreign office has received a dispatch from the German consul at the Pao, saying the dowager empress is believed to be inside the palace at Peking and the allies are still bombarding the fortifications thereof.

Japanese in the Palace. Washington, Aug. 20.—The Japanese legation, received a dispatch from Peking, saying: "After the entry into Peking by the allied troops the Japanese troops remained in the imperial palace. The body of the Japanese troops assigned to guard the palace met with obstinate resistance. The fighting is still going on."

Washington, Aug. 20.—The following cablegram has been received from Admiral Remy: "The Japanese troops are now recovering. The following were killed during the siege: Sergeant Fanning, Privates King, Tucker, Kennedy, Thomas, Turner and Fisher. Wounded: Private Schroeder and Seaman Mitchell. All other wounded and sick have returned to duty."

Congress for Peace Commissioner. Washington, Aug. 20.—The Chinese government, through Li Hung Chang, has made application to the United States for the appointment of Minister Conger, or other American official, with authority to open negotiations for the establishment of peace and for fixing definite terms for the settlement of the present trouble.

A Review of the News. Washington, Aug. 20.—The Chinese government today made a formal application through Li Hung Chang for the appointment of an American commissioner to bring about the cessation of hostilities in China and the restoration of general peace.

A Doctor Kills a Farmer, a Woman and the Sheriff.

SHERIFF KILLS HIM AS HE FALLS A Minnesota Farmer Slaughters His Wife and Four Children—Massachusetts Burglar Kills a Young Woman.

Washington, Aug. 20.—Wm. M. Johnson, of Hackensack, N. J., has been tendered and accepted the office of assistant postmaster general, made vacant by the resignation of Perry S. Heath.

New York, Aug. 20.—Gov. Roosevelt, Chairman Hanna and Cornelius N. Bliss were in conference at the national republican headquarters today.
