NO SUCCESSOR TO HURLBURY.  
The Passenger Service Will Be Handled by Present Force.

There is good reason for believing that no successor will be appointed to W. H. Hurlburt, who recently tendered his resignation as general passenger agent of the O. & N., says the Oregonian. It is in keeping with the late policy of the Union Pacific not to reappoint high salaried officers wherever it is possible to carry on the business without them. His plan seems to be to get off such officers when the opportunity offers like in the present instance, and consolidate the business under a few heads as possible.

There is no more reason for appointing a general passenger agent than there was for appointing a general freight agent, when the latter office was made vacant by the resignation of the general freight agent, in that case the office of assistant general freight agent and the office of general freight agent were consolidated under the one head, the business being carried on by Assistant General Agent Miller, which he has continued to do. The head for both the passenger and freight departments is Traffic Manager Canabell. He can carry on the passenger business under Chief Clerk Suttle just the same as he carries on the freight business under Agent Miller, and save the expenses of two high-salaried officers.

### WANTED ON OTHER CHARGES.

Merritt Wright, the Suicide, Had Pre-meditated the Act.  
Coroner W. G. Cole and Deputy Sheriff D. Turner returned late Friday afternoon from the scene of the Merritt Wright tragedy, 14 miles south of Pendleton and four miles west of Pilot Rock. An investigation by the coroner disclosed a state of affairs considerably at variance with the official report of Friday, January 25. When Wright spoke to the officers and told them he wanted to step into an adjoining room to change the suit of clothes he was wearing for another, he gave his mother-in-law, Mrs. C. J. Jenkins, a wink. Mrs. Jenkins knew he did not have another suit of clothes in the room into which he was going, but disclaimed any knowledge of his intention. Wright fired two shots from his rifle, the first one missing, the second taking effect. Wright was a son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. C. J. Jenkins, and made his home with them, on the Eastern place, which they purchased a few years ago.

The funeral of deceased will be held at Pilot Rock today.  
According to the testimony of Mrs. Jenkins, his mother-in-law, Wright had been dependent and morose for some time for a long while. The death of his wife hung heavily upon his mind. On one occasion he had attempted to purchase land and again had ransacked the house in search of carbolide acid. On the afternoon of the suicide he was in the house and told his mother-in-law he was going out to the pasture to look at some stock. He left the house, but instead of going to the pasture went in an opposite direction 200 yards to a strawstack. It is supposed that he at that time intended to kill himself, but changed his mind.

Merritt Wright had been under the surveillance of officers for the previous ten days, as he was supposed to be the man wanted by the authorities of Idaho for crime committed. Had he lived he would probably have gotten into trouble over alleged crimes committed in Grant county. He seemed to realize that he was in the toils and saw before him a series of years in the penitentiary, and from the outlook he recoiled and took his own life, rather than face the ignominy awaiting him.

He was assisted into another back and taken home, considerably bruised, but it is believed suffered no broken bones. Mrs. Hughes and the daughter escaped uninjured, which was almost miraculous. A large basket of dishes was in the back. It was jolted around considerably, but only a cup was broken.

### City of Salem Won.

The suit of the Pacific States Telephone and Telegraph company against the city of Salem for an injunction restraining the officers of the city from collecting the tax due on telephones under an ordinance of the city council, was decided by Judge R. P. Boise of the equity department of the circuit court in Salem, in favor of the city. The ordinance referred to was passed last August, and levied a tax of 5 cents a month on each telephone instrument in use within the city. The tax became due on September 1, but the company refused to pay the amount or furnish the officers with a list of the instruments in use.
