SPECIAL CITY ELECTION FOR SEWERAGE SYSTEM.

Tax-Payers to Voice Their Opinion With Regard to Issuing Bonds for \$30,000 - Sidewalk Ordered - Bills Allowed.

The council last night-

Set December 18 for city elec-tion to ascertain whether or not the tax-payers wanted to vote a debt of \$30,000 for a sewerage system.

Granted petition for sidewalk on

High street. Referred reports of marshal and recorder to finance committee. Granted and transferred liquor license.

Allowed bills.

It is now up to the voters of the city of Pendleton to say whether or be instilled. At the council meeting the special city election when the voters will have a chance to voice their sentiments on the subject.

The proposition, as presented by the council, is that a special election be held to ascertain if the want to vote a debt of \$30,000 on themselves for a sewerage system, as At the last meeting of Damon it is estimated that this will be the cost of installing a thorough system.

While the city council is unanimous on the matter it is the wish of this body to have the people give their expression through the ballot box at just as early a date as possible. This is to give the city a chance to get the preliminaries completed and be ready to begin work in the early spring if the voters are in favor of the propo-

Those Qualified.

Those qualified to vote at this election will be all property owners living in the city limits who had \$100 worth or more of property at the last assessment and none whose property does not exceed this will be allowed voice in the matter. The question qualification will rest entirely uplast assessment roll. rolls will be gone over and every man's and woman's name with more than \$100 worth of assessed preperty will be taken down and a list kept at each of the four voting places so that case there is a question as to the voter's eligibility to vote all that is required will be to turn to the list tax-payers and settle the matter. No registration is necessary and women are allowed to vote

Twenty-Year Bonds,

The bonds which the city will issue to pay for the sewerage system are to have a 20-year limit. That there will be no difficulty in floating these bonds there is no question. Already many inquiries have been sent to when the bonds would be issued, and capitalists have designated their intention of taking up the bonds without delay, There will be four polling places.
