TO HELP OREGON

DR. LE ROY, OF PORTLAND,
COLLECTING EXHIBITS.

Special Meeting of Commercial Association Tomorrow Night to Discuss the Subject of Advertising Oregon and Umatilla County.

Dr. A. LeRoy, of Portland, who succeeded Colonel Frank Drake as manager of the Oregon Information Bureau, arrived in the city on No. 2, last evening for the purpose of interesting the city and county in the matter of furnishing exhibits for the collection, now on hand in the Union Depot building at Portland.

Dr. LeRoy is well known throughout Eastern Oregon, having resided in La Grande and vicinity for years. He is now on an extended tour of the counties in the eastern portion of the state, and will remain in Pendleton until the last of the week.

A special meeting of the Commercial Association will be held at 8 o'clock tomorrow evening for the purpose of presenting the matter in the proper form to the citizens of Pendleton. A special invitation is extended to all to attend this meeting, and take active part in discussion of the subject.

Dr. LeRoy will address the meeting and will review the extent of the work already done in the state. He will be glad to receive any exhibits that may be ready for delivery, and is out on an active campaign for results.

The Pendleton Woolen Mills this morning presented two of the finished blankets in stock, to be placed on exhibit and every Pendleton institution is expected to be represented in that collection.

While Dr. LeRoy has been in the field but a short time, he has already secured excellent exhibits from Lane, Polk, Linn, Josephine, Jackson, Washington, Douglas, Yamhill, Lincoln and Multnomah counties and will remain in Eastern Oregon until the resources of this district are fully represented. He will collect one of the most magnificent mining exhibits ever brought together in the state from the Sumpter and Baker districts and the agricultural and manufacturing exhibits from this county should be no less splendid.

The floor space in the rooms of the bureau is sufficient to make a perfect display and it will not be hampered as such things usually are, by being crowded into a corner. The exhibits from each county are placed together in an attractive manner properly labeled and credited, and a competent and reliable man is constantly in charge, to direct strangers who may inquire for information on different portions of the state. It will be readily seen that the more exhibits maintained by a county, in this collection, the more readily will each county appeal to intending homeseekers. The purpose of the bureau is to introduce Oregon to her friends.

NEW DIRECTORS.

Building and Loan Association Will Also Choose Officers Soon.

The stockholders of the Oregon Building & Loan Association held their annual meeting last night, at which time the board of directors for the coming year was elected. The men elected last night were: R. Alexander, Max Baer, C. W. Brownfield, E. J. Murphy, C. J. Smith, J. B. Perry and T. F. Howard. These are the same as last year, with the exception of T. F. Howard, who was elected to fill the place caused by the resignation of C. S. Jackson, who was one of the directors before his removal from the city.

The association will have another meeting in a few days, at which the officers for the coming year will be elected.

The association has a capital stock of \$5,000,000 and is the only local corporation in the state that has to pay the maximum income tax of \$200. It is a strictly local concern and does business with the people of this city and vicinity.
