GENERAL NEWS

The largest apartment house in the world is now under way in New York City. It is 17 stories high, has 14 elevators and accommodates 18,000 people.

Samuel Jacobs, a Israel Jeweler, of Major Andre, of revolutionary fame, died September 4 at St. Joseph, Mo., aged 62 years. He was a civil engineer and inventor by occupation.

The federal government has brought suit for \$10,000 against the trustees of the Tennessee school from whose trustees Harvey Logan, the Montana state officer, obtained the money.

Mrs. John Drenth had boxes worth of jewelry stolen from her apartments last at Newport, and Mrs. Wm. Martin another society leader had \$2,000 worth of jewelry stolen at Alexander Bay.

A 16-year-old girl in Jefferson county, Kansas, last Friday underwent an operation to stimulate the bladder due to pointing ketones upon it from a man. It worked all right, but she and her baby sister were hurried to death.

NORTHWEST NEWS

An unknown man was yesterday killed by a street car in Tacoma, Friday. He was riding a wheel and was hurled into the air, breaking his neck in the fall.

C. P. Potter was held up at the corner of Sixth and Salmon streets in the heart of the city of Portland Friday morning and robbed of a few dollars in change.

Mrs. Fannie Gibson and Mrs. E. D. Bradford, of Marshfield, were run over and instantly killed by a logging train Friday morning in the woods near the city of Marshfield.

About 150 sheep were shot at Pedro mountains, near Ontario, Friday. This is the second attempt at wholesale sheep killing in this vicinity, as a large number were poisoned recently.

Two huge star hounds attacked Mrs. G. F. Timms, of Vancouver, B. C., Friday and were tearing her clothing into shreds, when she was rescued by men who had to beat the beasts off with clubs.

A serious row over gambling occurred in the village of Meadows, Malheur county, Friday, and as a result, Alex Landers, a gambler, was roped on the head with a billiard cue, and is not expected to live.

Sam Levine, a 16-year-old prisoner, was pardoned by Governor Chamberlain Friday. The boy was sentenced from Multnomah county for larceny and on account of his age a large petition was presented asking for his release.

John Selbert, of Montaville, Or., was located his last daughter by means of a dream. She had been lost for the better for 12 years, and he found her in Baltimore, as the result of a dream which drove him by search of that city. On the second day after his arrival in Baltimore, he was rewarded by finding his child, married and the mother of six children.

THE INDIAN TRADE

RESERVATION A GREAT SOURCE OF INCOME TO CITY.

About \$125,000 Per Year Spent by the Indians in This City and County—Indians Are Becoming Good Farmers—Many Seek an Education.

One of the greatest sources of income to the city of Pendleton, and other towns in Umatilla county is the Indian population, of the Umatilla reservation.

Pendleton makes a specialty of clothing for the trade, in carrying special goods and in demand on the reservation. Dry goods stores, the harness and saddle stores, the grocers and other branches of trade make special bids for the Indian trade by offering attractive designs, and specially manufactured goods.

Perhaps no other locality in the United States has made the same reputation as that enjoyed by the Pendleton Woolen Mills through the manufacture of its famous Indian clothing which were first made with a view to satisfying the demand among the Indians. From this start, these mills gradually became ready sources of supply for the Indian trade and today Umatilla & Hanna Pendleton is well and its sale or collection of goods and the article has been shipped to every market center in the United States in great numbers and to many foreign points.

The Umatilla Indian reservation consists of about 115,000 acres of land today. It formerly contained 150,000 acres but the different sales of Indian lands have cut down the territory to the present size.

Of this amount about 30,000 acres is farm land, and the balance hill and prairie land. Approximately 20,000 acres are rented to white farmers at an average of \$125 per acre per year. The remaining 85,000 acres of farm land is farmed by the Indians themselves.

This rental amounts to about \$2,500,000 per year and nine-tenths of this amount is spent in the city of Pendleton. The income from the land farmed by the Indians varies with different years, and probably amounts to \$1,000,000 per year, nearly all of which is spent in the city.

Charles Winters, agent of the Umatilla reservation, says the Indians who farm their own lands are becoming very good farmers and many of them especially expert teamsters. Their methods are improving every year and as they understand the value of industrious habits more thoroughly they reap greater rewards from their farms. Very few of the Indians are shiftless and out of a population of about 1,100, only a very small proportion of them are addicted to the drink habit.

The more prosperous Indians are to be found upon their farms or all those and those seen in the city from day to day, are those who are looking for a chance to get whiskey. The young Indians show an increasing desire for education and the efficient schools under the management of Miss M. V. Galcher, are having a greater influence every year.

One special feature of the Indian trade, worthy of mention is the local business afforded by their presence in the county. Their attorneys are busy most of the time, straightening out legal tangles, settling difficulties, advising and counseling their dusky clients, and it is the source of great income to the legal profession of the city. It is not an uncommon sight to see the entire Indian family sitting on the floor of the most prominent law offices in the city, while the attorneys and heads of the families are holding consultations on business affairs.

The better class of Indians have accounts at many of the leading stores and are given every consideration as they are good customers and the trade is worth entering in. The disbursement of about \$125,000 per year among the different business houses in the city means that the effort to get and hold the Indian trade is a special branch of the mercantile pursuit in this city and county.

WHITE MEN TO BUILD ROAD.

No Asiatics to Be Employed in British Columbia.

Vancouver, B. C., Sept. 4.—As the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway is to run for several hundred miles through this province, the British Columbia government has early taken steps to impress upon the federal authorities, who are chartering the line, its view that Asiatics should not be employed on the construction. When the Canadian Pacific was built the then government gave special power for the company to bring in Chinese, and it is claimed that it was then that the yellow peril fastened itself on this province. The local government believes the new road should be a white man's line all through.

Further, the provincial ministry has asked that the company be compelled to build its line in this province, starting at the coast and working eastward through the mountains to the prairie. There is a fear here that if this is not done the Grand Trunk Pacific may use Eskimo men and supplies exclusively. Any aid which British Columbia may subsequently give the line will be contingent on these conditions. It will be remembered that the Canadian Pacific built from west to east as well as from east to west, indeed its last mile was driven in the Rockies. The Underhill contract was of great benefit to the province.

Barley Average of 100 Bushels.

By far the largest barley yield yet reported to the Leader in this season of remarkable heavy crops was obtained at Joe Winters' place on Weston mountain, about five miles east of town, where threshing has just been finished by Carl's team. Five acres of barley yielded 150 bushels, at the almost incredible average of nearly 300 bushels per acre. This tract of ground was in corn and potatoes last year, indicating the value of diversified farming to the soil. Another tract of 15 acres at Mr. Winters' place yielded 150 bushels of barley. His total crop from barley was 1,200 bushels of wheat and barley—Weston Leader.

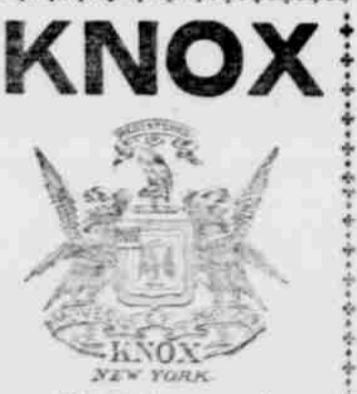
