NEW FORAGE CROP

Prolific Yields, Hardy and Adapted to This Climate.

J. G. Price, a farmer who lives in the vicinity of Pendleton, brought into the city this morning a sample of a fodder pea to this part of the state. The name of the pea is not yet catalogued as Perennial, and it is native to Africa, where it is much used as a food for cattle and other stock. It is especially a recommended crop in part and is also growing in the "natural" lands that grow here along the swampy grounds. This "pea" grows as it is called in Africa, grows however, in dry land and needs but little irrigation, if any. It grows to a great height and is said to be better than corn for the cattle.

From one seed from 45 to 80 stalks will spring, and as the grass is very sturdy, it is thought that it will be the coming fodder crop of this part of the country. It produces heavier than corn and grows faster and with little care. Mr. Price is optimistic in regard to the product and will raise quite a field of it the coming year.

UNIQUE FRONT.

Detachable and Removable Glass Frontage to a Business House.

GENERAL NEWS.

Lewellyn Smith, bookkeeper for Esick Bros. of Buffalo, N. Y., has absconded with about \$20,000 belonging to the firm.

The American Bridge Company of New York, has been awarded the contract of building a bridge over Snake river at Ontario, to cost \$2,750,000. The county of Malheur having appropriated \$1,500 toward the construction.

A great many farmers carry their crops on a long time after harvest waiting for advances in price. Those who need money can get a large part of the value of their crops in money and still hold the grain for an advance in the following manner:
Suppose a farmer has 100 bushels of wheat which he can sell at 60 cents a bushel. He can sell it at 50 cents a bushel in payment then let him buy 100 bushels of May wheat and margin it 2 cents a bushel. This will require \$100. He will then have \$50 in cash as he would if the price of May wheat goes up five cents per bushel. He will make the same as if he had held his 100 bushels of wheat to the granary.
