MUST PAY ITS TAX

ASSOCIATED PRESS STOCK IS TAXABLE.

Prosecuting Attorney of Spokane Orders the Stock of the Review Publishing Company Placed on the Assessment Rolls.

Spokane, Sept. 24.—Prosecuting Attorney Horace Kimball today rendered an opinion to County Auditor Z. Stewart, authorizing and instructing the latter to place upon the assessment rolls as personal property the membership in the Associated Press held by W. H. Cowles, owner of the Spokesman-Review and its evening editions, the Chronicle and Bulletin, and declaring that the action of the board of equalization in striking the same off the rolls was illegal.

When the board of equalization last month struck off the franchise assessments of the Spokesman-Review and Chronicle, Deputy Assessor Fred Leghorn, as a resident taxpayer, demanded of the auditor that he assess to W. H. Cowles, owner of the properties, a membership in the Associated Press.

The auditor asked advice of the county's legal advisor, and Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Miles Pondexter replied as follows:

"Statute 1, Sec. 1712, makes it the duty of the county auditor to place upon the assessment rolls any property which has been omitted by the assessor.

A contract or agreement with the organization known as the Associated Press, giving the holder the exclusive right to publish the press dispatches of said association within certain territory, is property, and as such, subject to taxation."

The auditor in accordance with the above placed the assessment upon the personal property list of W. H. Cowles. The board of equalization, against the advice of the prosecuting attorney, ordered that the assessment be stricken from the rolls, which was also done.

A further demand was made upon the auditor by Leghorn that he place the Associated Press membership again upon the rolls, and the auditor inquired whether it was his duty to do so after the action of the equalization board.

In his reply, Mr. Kimball says: "The action of the board of equalization was taken without any authority whatsoever on their part, the matter being wholly beyond their jurisdiction. It was proper and was your duty to place upon the assessment rolls against the holder thereof for taxation that certain contract or agreement with the organization known as the Associated Press as taxable property.

I advise that it is your duty to forthwith place the same upon said assessment rolls."

HILL HAS TROUBLES.

Employees Want More Pay and Shorter Hours.

St. Paul, Minn., Sept. 24.—A grievance committee representing the car men of the entire Great Northern system is in St. Paul formulating demands which will be presented to the management of the system within a few days.

The car men have not yet completed the schedule of the demands which they present, but it is stated that it will include many minor demands, with the question of wages and hours as the important feature. It will be delivered to the road late this week.

President Hill, to whom the questions between the road and its firemen and engineers have been referred, conferred with the consolidated grievance committee representing these branches yesterday without result. The men firmly refused to compromise. The dispute has been given over to Mr. Hill personally, indicating that it has reached an acute stage. Another conference has been called, at which compromise propositions made yesterday will be again discussed, in an effort to reach an understanding.

The Northern Pacific engineers and firemen scheduled to meet in St. Paul yesterday to present similar demands for increase in pay, will wait until the troubles on the Great Northern give promise of a settlement. None of the members of the Northern Pacific committee have yet reached St. Paul.

GENERAL NEWS

American plate glass manufacturers are preparing to sell their product much cheaper in Belgium than in America, long enough to destroy competition there.

Joseph Fidler picked the lock of the Yreka, Cal., jail with a key made from the steel rib of his necktie, a nail from the floor and tacks from his shoes, and escaped.

The United States courts hold that deeds of conveyance of allotted Indian lands made without the inspection and sanction of the secretary of the interior, are invalid.

The most tremendous, gorgeous, flamboyant and spectacular Chinese funeral ever seen in San Francisco, was that given Tom Kiu Yung, the military attaché, who suicided last week by turning on the gas.

Oil wells, tanks and derricks are burning on a vast scale in the Beaumont district, Texas. This is the second wholesale fire there within six months. Rival oil companies are suspected of promoting the conflagrations.

HOP MARKET GOOD.

Foreign Demand and Price Encouraging to Growers.

Salem, Sept. 24.—Some few sales of hops are being made, the price thus far paid being 22 to 23 cents a pound. There are a good many samples of the earlier pick, and mold is showing in some of them. When the hops from the best yards come in they will be found to be all right.

The market remains steady, not only locally, but in foreign countries as well, and it may be said that it has scarcely opened yet. A telegram from Nuremberg, Germany, regarding the hop situation there, says the market is quiet, but that the prices for export are unchanged.

The same conditions are reported from the London market, there being little change in the market quotations from those of the past 10 days.
