There is one permanent fixture in the Pendleton postoffice which Uncle Sam does not check up in his quarterly accounting of the resources and income of the office.

It is a dainty stool, about six inches high, covered with carpet and left standing on the floor next to the lock boxes, and has been placed there by the thoughtfulness of Postmaster Livermore, so short patrons of the office may step up and look into the upper boxes, if they happen to be renting in the upper row.

Many an accommodating tall patron of the office has answered the sweet request to "please unlock my box, it is so high," or "please tell me if there is anything in No. —; I can't see from the floor."

O'Donnell exhaustive information concerning the Northwest, and an urgent invitation to migrate and send a delegation to finally determine upon a place of colonization, says the Telegram.

of the South African army made an investigation of the Milk river valley, along the line of the Great Northern railway from Hinsdale to Great Falls, a distance of more than 100 miles, and on the Crow reservation and in the Teton country, along the Northern Pacific. Climate, soil, crop production, water, transportation and the stock and farming industry were gone into thoroughly, and when the report was printed in Dutch and sent to the countrymen of the investigators it contained complete information of that region and commended the Northwestern states of this country to the Boer people as most likely to be found desirable for their future citizenship.

# WOODMEN SOCIAL

PENDLETON CAMP ENTER-TAINS 300 OF ITS FRIENDS

Literary and Musical Program at Secret Society Hall—Refreshments and Sociability in Abundance—Camps Ask for Continuance of the Membership Campaign.

Fraternity and good-fellowship overflowed at Secret Society hall Saturday night, when about 300 Woodmen of the World, their wives and friends, assembled in a social session of the Boer people at the business meeting at which three new members were initiated.

The lodge room was filled to overflowing, many being compelled to stand during the program. All the available benches from the banquet hall, all the regular seats and a wagon load of chairs from the furniture store were brought into commission to accommodate the large crowd. It was a heart to heart social meeting of the Woodmen and their friends and the literary program and refreshments completed one of the most enjoyable events of the season.

Consul Commander J. H. Lawrey made a brief and appropriate address of welcome and A. J. Owen presided over the meeting. The following literary and musical program was rendered:

After the program refreshments consisting of ice cream and cake, were served, the crowd forming into jolly groups in a social session. While the camp had not prepared for such an attendance, the committees in charge met the occasion gracefully and there were refreshments left over.

At the business meeting it was decided to ask to extend the membership campaign which closed on April 1, to July 1, as the results have been so highly satisfactory. The camp now has a membership of about 500, being the largest single camp in the state outside of Portland.

### JAIL INVENTORY.

Followed by a General Clearing of the Decks.

District Attorney Halley made a little cleaning up at his hotel at the court house yesterday afternoon, when he arraigned all those who have been in the county jail for some time on various charges.

Rodney Dupuis, the boy who has been in jail for a couple of weeks, having struck Charles Bronson over the eye with a large stone at the ball game, was released. Dupuis pleaded guilty to the charge of assault with a deadly weapon, and sentence was suspended during good behavior. His sentence will be to the penitentiary should he force the court to impose it, and he will be allowed his liberty only as long as he behaves himself.

Jesse Griffin, who stole a pair of trousers from the Penland lodging house some time ago, pleaded guilty to petit larceny and was fined \$20. Not having the money, he will serve 10 days in jail.

August Becher pleaded guilty to the crime of larceny and was fined \$75. His partner, George Bradley, was also arraigned on the same charge, and was given the same sentence. Both were unable to furnish the cash and will spend 37 days in the jail. These were the men who stole the case of brandy some time ago from Swearingen brothers.

### GENERAL SATISFACTION.

Property Owners Have Very Few Kicks Coming This Year.

H. J. Taylor brought in his returns as deputy assessor this morning. Mr. Taylor, who has assessed for several years, reports that there is more general acquiescence in the plan of assessment and in the valuations this year than ever before; fewer objections are made, and the general expression is of satisfaction.

There is very little difference in the volume of property as compared with last year so far as livestock and other chattels are concerned.

Major Moorhouse Takes Cartoonist's Picture Standing by a Teepee With Indian Woman.

While on his recent visit to this city Homer Davenport visited the Umatilla reservation in company with Major Moorhouse and W. H. Babb, and among the numerous escapades of the cartoonist on the reservation was to have his photograph taken standing in front of a teepee in company with Mrs. Black, a Umatilla Indian woman, who is a sister-in-law to Howlish Wampo, with whom

Mr. Davenport's father was a particular favorite on the reservation.

The cartoonist visited the grave of Howlish Wampo, and talked with his sister-in-law on the reservation, and took numerous mental sketches of the country around the agency, where his father was once Umatilla Indian agent. Major Moorhouse prizes the Davenport photograph very highly and has just finished a number of them for his friends.

### Unfortunate Accident.

Mrs. Nettie Burt, who lives on West Alta street, was thrown from a horse yesterday evening and her left leg was broken. The horse she was riding became fractious and she was thrown with her whole weight on her left ankle. Both bones were broken, and the injury will confine her to the house rather longer than hurts of that character usually make necessary.

### Visiting Printer.

V. G. Willison, formerly foreman in the East Oregonian mechanical department, is here on a visit from Portland, where he is employed in the office of F. W. Baltes. He is now engaged in making up the forms for the 300,000 edition of the Lewis and Clark descriptive booklet, which is being issued from the office of F. W. Baltes.

### New Bridge at Nolin.

The river bridge over the Umatilla at Nolin will be built as soon as the bids can be acted upon and other preliminaries decided. It will be built upon the old piers, and will cost about \$3,000. The old bridge is used somewhat, although it has been condemned about a year and is altogether unsafe.

### Moved Offices.

J. T. Hinkle has moved his office into the rooms formerly and for so long occupied by the telephone office in the Savings Bank building, the large room being occupied by his library, the smaller as a private consultation room. The Umatilla County Abstract Company, also has its offices in the same rooms.

### Digging Test Pits.

The government party in the vicinity of Echo is busily engaged in digging test pits from which will be determined the exact course of the ditches which will feed the Butter creek reservoir. About 20 men are in the party.

### A. Perard's Wool Coming in.

A six-horse team brought in 26 sacks of wool belonging to A. Perard, of Pilot Rock, today, for storage in the Furnish warehouse. Mr. Perard will shear about 85 sacks, which will all be stored here for the sales on May 23.

### William Keller Returned.

William Keller, of the Thompson-Goodman Hardware Company, has returned from a visit to Portland, where he has been for some time for the benefit of his health. He is much improved and resumed his duties this morning.

### Dorothy Neff Recovering.

Dorothy, the 3-year-old daughter of the Mr. Neff, the proprietor of the Alta House, is still quite ill with typhoid fever, but barring any unexpected complications or other setbacks, will recover in a short time.

### Bad News for George Darveau.

George Darveau, proprietor of the Hotel St. George, received a telegram this morning from Montreal, stating that his sister, Mrs. E. J. Smith of that city, died there last night of dropsy, after an extended illness.

### Mr. Coon is Recovering.

B. E. Coon, who has been dangerously ill with pleuro-pneumonia, is somewhat better today, and is considered to have an excellent chance for recovery. The trouble began with an attack of pleurisy.
