GENERAL NEWS.

The gold output of the world during 1903 was \$327,049,750. Of silver, copper and lead \$886,591,530.

Foreign orders for American steel are now on file calling for 100,000 tons per month for seven months.

A New Yorker shot at a porch-climber, missed him, and the bullet seriously wounded a child one block away.

While the nuns of St. Elizabeth's hospital, Chicago, were at worship, burglars blew the institution safe and secured \$3,500 cash, besides gold ornaments.

Alfred Morgan, a wealthy hermit of New Jersey, and cousin of J. Pierpont Morgan, was burned to death in his house at Vineland. Origin of the fire is unknown.

George Albanusius, of Catskill, N. Y., danced so hard and long that he blistered his heel. Dye from a stocking poisoned the wound and he died of blood poisoning.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Portland Japanese will send home the remaining half of their war fund, amounting to \$7,500, this week.

It is reported that the Tacoma & Eastern railway will build into the Cowlitz river coal fields, this season.

Louis Bettman, for 50 years a leading merchant in Olympia, Wash., is dead. He came to Puget Sound in 1850.

An electric car line from Portland to Hillsboro will be built if the people of the intervening towns will raise a bonus of \$50,000.

A reward of \$1,100 has been offered for the recovery of Pruett Baker, 2 1/2 years old, who was kidnapped at Seattle, last week.

Mrs. William Hahn, of Portland, was overcome by smoke in her burning home, Thursday, and was revived after being given up for dead.

The Episcopal clergymen now in session at Seattle have recommended that the clergymen of that church refuse to marry divorced people, hereafter.

A pool of 175,000 pounds of Polk county wool was sold to the Oregon City Woolen Mills, Thursday, for 18 1/2 cents a pound, the highest price so far reported this season.

A conference of the traffic managers of the Western railroads is being held at Portland, to consider some protection against ticket scalping during the Lewis and Clark fair.

General Joubert, the Boer general, who has been touring the Northwest in the interest of the Boer colonization, and who has been denounced as a fraud by the Boer authorities, is busy explaining his title as "general" which he says was obtained on the battlefield.

Dr. O. B. Whitford, a millionaire of Butte, had caused the arrest of Miss Bessie Driscoll, alleging that she attempted to blackmail him while she claims that he is the father of her 3-months-old child and she simply wishes adequate support for it and herself.

THE ACADEMY PLAN CHANGED

ALL GRADES BELOW THE SEVENTH ARE DROPPED.

Work of Pendleton Academy to Be Centered on Academic and Preparatory Departments—W. H. Bleakney Retained as Principal—Bess Craig, Theresa Porter and Flora Walker Employed as Teachers—Academy Expended \$2,904 in Pendleton in the Past Year—Prospects Highly Encouraging.

The trustees of Pendleton Academy met at Hotel Bickers last night and outlined the policy of the academy for the ensuing year, employed four teachers, elected officers to hold until the annual meeting in October, and transacted all the current business incident upon the close of the school year.

Six members of the board were present at the meeting as follows: Lot Livermore, president; Dr. W. S. Holt, of Portland; Frederick Nolf, treasurer; Rev. W. H. Bleakney, Rev. W. L. Van Nuys and Bert Huffman.

Frederick Nolf was elected treasurer and Rev. W. L. Van Nuys secretary to hold office until the regular election at the October meeting. Rev. W. H. Bleakney and Bert Huffman were elected as an executive board.

The most important business transacted at the meeting was the entire change of plan of the departments of the institution, whereby everything below the seventh grade was abolished, the academy hereafter to admit no scholars below the seventh and the entire force and strength of the institution to be centered in preparatory work in the seventh and eighth grades and in the academic course.

The plan does away with three teachers in the primary and intermediate grades, which have been maintained at a partial loss, and concentrates the efforts of the academy on higher school work, that is particularly demanded in this section of Oregon.

Rev. W. H. Bleakney was unanimously elected principal for the ensuing year, Miss Theresa Porter was elected to the preparatory department, Miss Bess Craig to the department of modern languages and Miss Flora Walker to the position of assistant teacher. One teacher is yet to be employed.

The report of the principal for the past year was filed, showing that the academy had expended in running expenses for the past year the sum of \$2,904, all of which has been spent in Pendleton. The total enrollment for the year was 109, 37 in the academy and 72 in the grades.

Reports were received from the Presbytery of Eastern Oregon, showing a renewed and more vigorous moral support on the part of that body and also from the churches of Eastern Oregon, for the academy, and the coming year promises to be one of especial importance in the history of the institution if the city of Pendleton, the churches and Presbytery of Eastern Oregon and the general educational boards of the church take the interest in the welfare of a new institution that should be taken.

The plan to drop the lower grades will especially appeal to the demand for academic work in Eastern Oregon. It will offer to students desiring higher school work an especial opportunity in Pendleton.

The rate of tuition was fixed at \$40 per term, with special inducements where two or more come from one family, and partial arrangements were begun, looking to a limited dormitory for the academy if demanded.

The property of the academy, including the grounds, building, furniture, paraphernalia, and school apparatus, amounts to over \$16,000, with about \$300 indebtedness, and it is in a position to become the leading private school in Eastern Oregon, if the proper encouragement and support is given it by those directly interested in its welfare.

Rev. Bleakney will take a month's vacation from his duties, and will then begin the work of canvassing Eastern Oregon and Washington for students for the coming year.

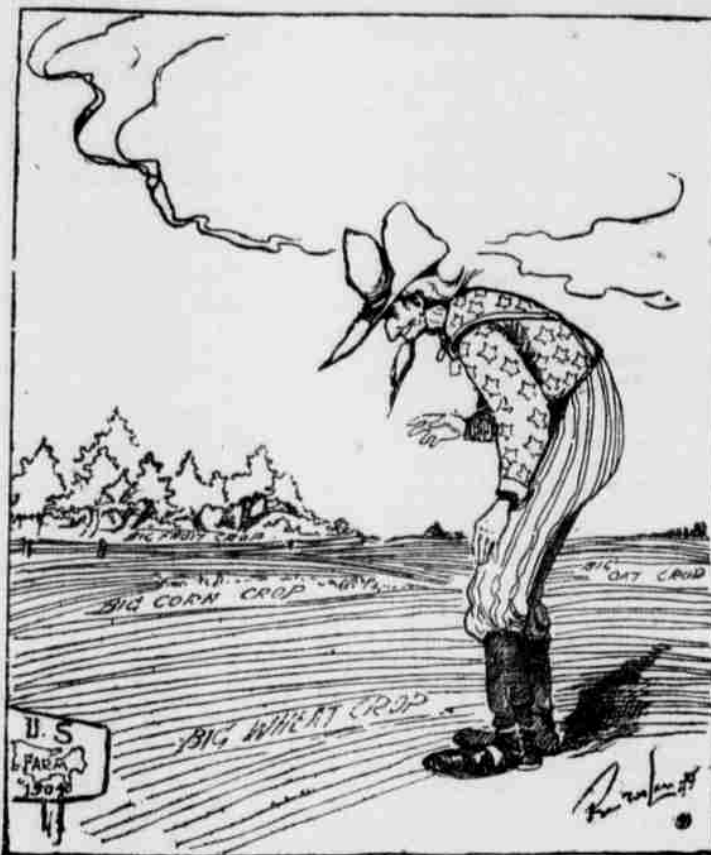

Portland, Ind., May 26.—Robert J. Knox, a former lawyer and society man and college graduate, was found guilty this morning of forgery, and will receive from two to fourteen years sentence. It is his third prison sentence.

BALCLUTHA LOST.

Went Ashore on Goose Island—No Lives Were Lost.

San Francisco, May 26.—The Alaska Packers Company's ship Balclutha, which left here April 27 with several hundred whites and Chinese laborers for canneries in Alaska, went ashore May 16 on Goose Island, off Kakiak. According to information received today, all on board were saved. The ship will probably be a total loss. The cargo may be saved.
