GENERAL NEWS.

Russia has rescinded an order for 100,000 bullet-proof breast-plates with an Italian firm.

Mrs. Denman Thompson, wife of the famous actor and author, died Sunday at Keene, N. H., her old home.

The scarcity of water in Port Arthur is occasioned by the destruction of the condensing plants by Japanese shells.

John C. Peters, a pugilist, was killed by a knock-out blow delivered by Patrick Dorman, at West Bergen, N. J., Sunday.

The London stock market now shows a more cheerful tone than at any time since the beginning of the Russo-Japanese war.

The genuine expressions of regret at Harcourt's death are more abundant than at any English death since that of Queen Victoria.

A Russian steamer used in clearing the harbor of Port Arthur of damaged and disconnected mines struck a mine Sunday and was sunk.

Jesse W. Crosby, a Mormon, has resigned from the republican electoral ticket in Wyoming. It will switch the Murman vote to the democratic electors.

Two sets of campaign buttons have been ordered by the democrats, one set with silk background for Nebraska and one set with gold background for other states.

The Yukon river is falling at the rate of two inches a day and an early freeze is expected this year. All the boats are working to fullest capacity to get out the freight and passengers before the river closes.

Four men and a negro woman were killed by Charles Getreil of Memphis, Tenn., Sunday. Getreil was crazed with fever and rushed from bed in a night dress and shot down the first people he met.

ALBA NEWS NOTES

GREAT VALUE RECEIVED FINE PASTURE RAINS.

The Gibbinses and Tiscants Have Moved to Pine Valley—Old-Timer Returned for a Visit—Joe Keeney is Modernizing His Stock Ranch—Alba Sawmill Will Make Full Run—Much Activity in the Cattle Market—Hint Thrown Out to Pendleton Business Men.

Alba, Oct. 3.—The 20 hours steady rain a week ago, followed by a warm day and no frost at night have caused the grass to shoot up like spring time, and the beef cattle now in pasture are filling up and gaining about as much as in early summer.

Joseph Gibbin, who has been a resident here for 20 years, has with his sons and son-in-law, Fred Tiscant, moved to Pine Valley to make their future home.

Milton Russell, an old-timer of this place, who has been East for two years, is here visiting friends and is now better satisfied with Oregon than ever.

Joe Keeney, the oldest stage contractor on the Pacific coast, has moved his band of horses from Elgin to his stock ranch near Alba, and has now gone back, accompanied with his cowboys, after his cattle, and will turn his old ranch here into a modern stock farm.

The Sumpter and Burns railroad is now within 22 miles of Susanville, and when the rails are laid it will pass within 18 miles of that burg. The road is a narrow gauge, but has already caused the freight hauling through here to fall one-half, as the John Day country can now get their supplies from Baker City. Unless Pendleton gets a move on herself the southern trade will soon be a thing of the past.

The Alba sawmill is having logs hauled in and will make a run this fall, so that they can fill special orders daily coming in.

There are a few span of heavy draft horses here for sale.

Major Holmes of Pendleton, is visiting friends here.

Those who has seen the snows of so winters, went to Pendleton last week and bought a new hair wagon, and hauled in a load of supplies.

James Jones passed through here with a large drove of beef cattle.

Langhorn bought fat cattle here last week of several parties, and continued south to purchase more.

PRESIDENTIAL ELECTORS.

Names of the Candidates to Be Voted for in Oregon at the Coming Election.

The public schools are studying current events and in the course of the study the pupils were to name the presidential electors on the republican and democratic tickets in Oregon.

This forenoon the East Oregonian received 21 requests from pupils for the names of the electors on both tickets, and to place the information within their reach, the names of the electors on both tickets are cheerfully published again, although they have appeared in this paper about ten times since they were nominated last spring.

The republican candidates are: G. B. Dimmick, of Clackamas county; A. C. Hough, of Josephine county; J. N. Hart, of Polk, and James A. Fee, of Umatilla.

The democratic candidates are: W. S. Hamilton, of Douglas; John A. Jeffrey, of Marion; W. B. Diller, of Columbia, and T. H. Crawford, of Union.

TRAINS RUN SLOWER.

O. R. & N. Increases Safety of Freight Trains on the Mountain.

One of the most important changes in the operation of freight trains ever made since the O. R. & N. has been in existence, has been instituted on the Blue mountains, recently.

The running time of the trains on the steep mountain grades between Kamela and Hilgard on the east side, and between Kamela and Huron on the west slope, has been made 50 per cent slower than formerly, and the trains are now let down the mountain with the air brakes almost exclusively, the hand brakes being used but little.

This change is made to enable the engineers to stop on short notice whenever necessary, to avoid bad accidents and runaways. Formerly the run down the mountain was made at such speed that had the brakes not been working well, it would have been impossible to stop on the steep grades. The heavier trains now being handled make it necessary to run slowly and with the utmost caution.

Where the run of 11 miles from Kamela to Hilgard was made in 25 to 30 minutes, the train must now use 45 minutes. A like change in the time on the west side has been made.
