Among the Exchanges of the Inland Empire

Bear Surrendered at Sunnyside. R. C. Bear, the Prosser horse thief and jail breaker, who with "Kid" Barker, murderer and desperado, escaped from the Benton county jail last Thursday night, was taken into custody at Sunnyside about 5 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

Bear, whose trail had been followed into the Rattlesnake hills and lost, wandered for two nights and two days on the hills in the lower valley, and being unable to withstand the cold or longer starve he headed for the town of Sunnyside and there surrendered.

The horse thief surrendered in the restaurant of Frank Moody. He walked into the town and immediately sought a restaurant. He ordered a meal which he ate ravenously, and being a stranger aroused suspicion of the restaurant keeper.

When Bear had finished his meal, having ordered several times, he inquired for a policeman. It was then that Moody felt assured that his suspicions were correct. He was certain that the man before him was either Barker or Bear.

"I have no money," said Bear. "I want to see a policeman."

Bear stated that his experience had been harrowing. He had not slept a wink since Thursday night, had had nothing to eat, and felt at times as though he would lie down and die. He said that he knew nothing of the whereabouts of Barker.—Yakima Republic.

Foul Play Suspected.

News reached this city last Monday of the death of George V. Owens, who resided at Rock Creek in the Spanish Gulch country, which occurred last Sunday, when it is reported that he committed suicide by shooting himself through the heart, death being instantaneous. A physician at Mitchell was sent for, and it is reported that the body was buried without an inquest being held.

Mr. Owens had been in bad health for many years, from a complication of diseases which it is said had given him much trouble of late. His death was caused by a shot from a large cap and ball pistol, and the report that his clothing was not powder-burned has caused unfavorable comment in the Rock Creek country.

The deceased was a pioneer resident of Grant county, and is known to many people here at the present time. He is a member of Canyon City lodge No. 34, A. F. and A. M., of this city. The circumstances surrounding his death have been called to the attention of the lodge.

Mr. Owens was past 80 years of

age. He was married to Miss Francis P. Francher, daughter of Joseph Francher, November 26, 1881, who lived near this city, who, with three sons and a daughter, survive him.—Blue Mountain Eagle.

Sold \$250,000 Mine.

One of the biggest financial transactions ever pulled off in this city was closed here today between Geo. A. Petty, a well-to-do farmer of this valley, and well known in this city, Harry S. Lowe, his representative, of Sacramento, Cal., and E. A. Bradley of Revelstoke, B. C. The latter of the trio represented an eastern syndicate of Cleveland and New York, and through him a deal was closed by which Mr. Petty sold to the eastern syndicate his famous Lone Bachelor silver mine for the sum of \$250,000.

Harry S. Lowe, attorney and representative of Mr. Petty, who is also partly interested in the Lone Bachelor mine, arrived here Saturday night with Mr. Bradley from Spokane, having recently returned from Slocan, B. C., where the mine is located, and the three men this morning closed all the final details of the sale which according to their statements has been under headway for several months.—Yakima Republic.

Crossing Columbia on Ice.

A solid bridge of ice from Crate's Point to a point about a half mile above the city covers old Columbia—a strong one, too, which pedestrians are not afraid to trust their lives on and many claim stock and heavy vehicles could cross on it with not the slightest danger.

Below Crate's Point as far as Lyle, the river is said to be clear, but extending from Lyle to Memorial island is another blockade. Saturday the steamers Kellogg and Dalles City made their way to the island, and then finding it impossible to cut their way further, tied up at Stanley's three miles above Hood River. The Little Maja is also there.

Stove Gas Burned House. The school building in the John Gleaser district, north of Riverview, near the county line, was wrecked and burned last Friday night. The district is a fractional one, numbered 11 in Adams county and numbered 125 in Lincoln county. The school building was located in Adams county. The teacher was Mrs. Lenora R. Lofton of Walla Walla, a graduate of Whitman college. Before leaving the building in the evening she filled the stove with coal, in order that a fire might be kept during the night, and all the dampers and drafts were closed.
