When Pear had finished his meal, having ordered several times, he inquired for a policeman. It was then that Moody felt assured that his suspicions were correct. He was cer-tain that the man before him was either Barker or Bear.

"I have no money," said Bear. "I want to se a policeman."

Bear stated that his experience had been harrowing. He had not slept a wink since Thursday night, had had nothing to eat, and felt at times as though he would lie down and die. He said that he knew nothing of the whereabouts of Barker .-Yakima Republic.
