CREW WAS FIRED

UMATILLA CENTRAL GANGS KICKED AT THE COOK

To be Rid of Bickerings Among Dissatisfied Members of the Pilot Rock Branch Tracklaying Crew, Foreman John D. Isaacs Discharged the Entire Force Except Commissary Clerk George M. Carey.

Today no tracklaying crew has been at work extending the line of the Umatilla Central towards the goal at Pilot Rock.

From the account that has reached the city from the O. R. & N. company's camp at the mouth of Birch creek it seems that for some time past the workmen have been dissatisfied with the particularly variety of food provided at the company's mess tent.

Although the Birch creek camp is an ideal one in location and the commissary is under the careful management of George Carey, late of the Pullman dining car service, the menu has not been satisfactory to the toilers, who have been placing the ties and the steel upon the branch line.

Yesterday afternoon, so the story goes, the bickerings among the men became so discordant that with one fell blow John D. Isaacs, who is in charge of the work, discharged the entire crew, foreman, cook and all.

This morning the entire crew of discharged workmen came to Pendleton for the purpose of securing their pay preparatory to leaving for other fields of labor.

H. A. Brandon, assistant engineer, under whose management falls the work on the Umatilla Central and other projects in the inland empire, was in Portland at the time of the crisis at the Birch creek camp.

It is said that following the discharge of the tracklaying crew last evening the men became threatening in their attitude and that during the evening Mr. Carey sat in his tent under arms, fearing that the commissary might be attacked.

logical finds recorded in eastern Oregon was made this week by Bert Campbell at the home of his mother, Mrs. Rose Campbell, north of the river.

The specimen consists of a round lava rock the size of the crown of a hat, on the inside of which was encased a perfect shell about four inches across, every rib and line of which was deeply imprinted in the solid rock.

A fire had been started in the back yard of the Campbell home for the purpose of burning up a pile of trash, and this rock, together with others of the same size and appearance, was in the trash pile.

The rock is common lava and it is the opinion of those versed in geology and who have seen the rock, that the shell was encased in the molten lava in some prehistoric eruption in the Blue mountains and has been rolling about since that time.

TO PAY MONUMENT DEBT.

"Whitman Sunday" Is Day Set for Collections to Be Made.

"Whitman Sunday" is the name applied to Sunday, October 27, by the churches of the Washington Congregational association and the Washington Presbyterian synod, which will on that day take a special collection, the proceeds from which will be devoted to paying the debt on the Whitman monument, says the Walla Walla Union.

There is at present a debt of \$1150 on the monument, all of which the above Presbyterian and Congregational churches have pledged themselves to pay, each denomination to pay one-half.

In appreciation of the efforts of these churches, each church has been requested to send delegates to the services held in observance of the 50th anniversary of the Whitman massacre. These services will be held at Whitman college, November 29.
