ASK THAT SHERIFF BE RESTRAINED.

Permanent Injunction Preventing Officers From Enforcing Prohibition Law is Requested-Allegations and Same as those Made in Temporary Injunction Suit-Phelps Will Have Answer Ready To-morrow-Demarrer Prepared But Probably Will Not be Entered-Will Try Case Out On Its Merits at Once,

At last the amended complaint in he Nolte case has been prepared and a copy of the same was served upon District Attorney Phelps this mersing. The complaint differs from the original in that it asks that the court issue an order restraining the shering from enforcing the provisions of the prohibition law when the same goes into effect July 1.

With the exception of this one feature the amended complaint is the same as the first one filed. The allegations of error on the part of the county court, sheriff and clerk and the same as in the first case,

District Attorney Phelps is now esgaged upon an answer to the new omplaint and says he will be ready to file the same which the case will then be at issue. According to Mr. Phelps he will answer the complaint upon its merits, denying all of the allegations made by the saloonmen. In addition be will also have a demurrer prepared should he desire to use the same.
