

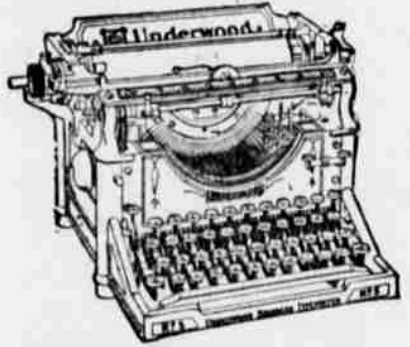

TURN TRUSTS TO GOOD. SAYS WEST

GOVERNOR DECLARES THEY ARE HERE TO REMAIN

Advocates Government Ownership of All Public Utilities and Believes Federal Control Is Initial Step Toward This End.

Portland, Ore., Nov. 20.—At a meeting of the Jackson club in this city the last of the week, Governor Oswald West, in speaking of trusts, addressed the members as follows:

Wants Government Ownership.
"What we need is constructive legislation, not destructive legislation. We want to build up, not tear down. No matter whether we like it or not, and in spite of the Sherman act, the large combinations of capital have come to stay. They have become the warp and woof of our industrial life and it is up to us to quit wasting our time railing at them, and by using our wits turn them to good account."

"I am a firm believer in government ownership of all public utilities and all public monopolies. Not, however, until the people, through investigation and experience are equipped to properly administer their affairs."

"Federal control is the first and greatest step in this direction, through federal and state control of railroads, especially since the passage of the Hepburn act in 1906, the people are becoming familiar with the affairs of the railroads of the country. They have learned more about the management of railroads in the past 10 years than they ever learned before. It has been a campaign of education, and the people are preparing themselves for the day of government ownership. In the mean time they are seeing rebates and discriminations prohibited, rates reduced and service improved."

To Cover All Trusts.
"Federal control should be extended to all trusts and monopolies and combinations of capital. The people will not only have a chance to become familiar with the inside workings and affairs of these concerns, but will be

in better position to protect themselves from extortion, through high prices.

"Immediate steps should be taken by the federal government and states to assume control over the stock and bond issues of all railroad and other corporations, for it is not only needed to protect the small investor, but will remove any possibility of undue inflation, should it appear that the government was about to take them over and operate them in the interest of the people."

"The people have been systematically robbed by the trusts. But in carrying out their selfish ends, these trusts have perfected wonderful organizations of efficiency and economy. They can turn out products at a far less cost than could be done under the old system. Let us take advantage of their work. Let us say to them: 'You have robbed the people long enough. We are going to take a hand in your affairs. You like the railroads, will be allowed a fair return upon your investment, but no more.'

Will Take Them Over.
"One of these days when we learn more about your business and become satisfied that we can run it successfully, we are going to take it over by paying you a fair price for it and run it in the interest and for the profit of all the people."

"I think it can be said that, after all, the trust, with all its robbery and corruption, has served a good purpose. It is hurrying along government ownership of all monopolies and will eventually put the ownership of all necessities of life, such as oil and coal and power back into the hands of the people, where they belong."

DR. ELLIOT TALKS OF PEACE TO FRENCH ARBITRATION GROUP

President Emeritus of Harvard Given Cordial Reception—Going to Orient to Study Under Carnegie Foundation.

Paris.—Dr. Charles W. Elliot, president emeritus of Harvard university, was given a cordial reception by the parliamentary arbitration group in the senate chamber.

Baron d'Estournelles de Constant president and expressed the felicitations of the group over the American educator's work in the interest of peace and the attitude of Harvard and other American universities toward the extension of the policy of arbitration in the settlement of the quarrels of the world as proposed by President Taft.

Responding Dr. Elliot declared that the campaign for arbitration was making great progress in the public opinion of America, and that personally he was an active advocate of the peace movement. He said he was going to the Orient to study under the auspices of the Carnegie Peace Foundation.

DIVORCED FROM SOLDIER HUSBAND AFTER 41 YEARS

Wife, 75 Years Old, Granted Divorce From Civil War Veteran—Friendship for Another Woman Starts Trouble.

New York.—Mrs. Joseph Ernest Dye, 75 years old, won her suit for divorce from Colonel Dye, 70 years old, a veteran of the Civil war and member of the Old Guard, when a jury brought in its verdict in the case before Justice Bronbaum in the Supreme Court. The jury was out about an hour.

Colonel Dye admitted on the witness stand today that it was at the suggestion of his wife that he went to New Jersey with her and married her in 1877. He testified that they had been living together for several years after Mrs. Dye's first husband, William H. Duke Hurst, had obtained a divorce from her, naming Dye as co-respondent.

"What reason did she give for wanting you to have a ceremonial mar-

riage performed?" asked I. N. Jacobson counsel for Mrs. Dye.

"She said that her daughter was getting older and she thought it was better that we be married," replied the Colonel.

The couple were happy, Mrs. Dye declares, until the erstwhile regimental leader discovered his friendship for another woman.

MUTINY IN PRISON CAMP.

Stone Quarry Gang in Kansas City, Kan., Overpower Guard.

Kansas City, Mo.—Seventeen county prisoners working in a stone quarry on the outskirts of Kansas City, Kan., mutinied, and after a revolver fight with their guards two of them escaped. Only two guards were on duty. A negro prisoner suddenly springing upon Owen Williams, the guard stationed at the mouth of the quarry, gave the signal for the mutiny. Williams was severely beaten and his revolver taken from him. After an exchange of a dozen shots N. A. Thompson, the other guard, overcame all the prisoners except two negroes, who escaped into the woods.

FIND THE SEEDLESS LEMON.

Accident Reveals What Experts Have Searched for for Years.

San Bernardino.—The seedless lemon, which botanical experts have unsuccessfully labored to produce for many years, has been discovered here. The bud wood from which the trees now bearing the seedless lemons have been growing came from a sample provided by the Department of Agriculture a number of years ago, having been labeled "citron of commerce."

Instead of citron, however, the trees are bearing seedless lemons. The original bud came from Italy.
