Cleaning Up.

The great thing is to make a good start; I clear the dining room table for instance on a plan. First take away every article that has not been used, putting each one into its proper place at once.

Next clear away the used forks, knives and spoons, laying them in a kind of little wooden plate basket. This can be bought at any 5 and 10 cent store and every day put thick clean paper at the bottom of its two compartments.

The third step is to bear off the glasses that have been used on a tray and set them on the kitchen table, which is covered with newspapers till the washing up is through. The last step is to bear all the dirty dishes and plates to the sink where the real work awaits its start.

Don't pile a heap of crockery into a large pan. After scraping away all scraps into a pan kept for the purpose, put each article separately into a small pan filled with very hot water and soda. In this it is well rubbed with a small mop (costing only 5 cents) till all the grease is gone. Directly this is done the dish is put into another small pan filled with lukewarm soapy water. Here it is rubbed with a piece of soft flannel or linen. When every article has had its second water, the soapy tub

is filled with fresh cold water, and every piece of china passed through it and set in the rack to drain.

The value of this triple water process is soon seen in the drying, for it makes smearing impossible, each plate and dish coming to a polish in a trice. Try it and see how the mop preserves your hands and how the whole arrangement lessens that horrid feeling of stickiness and muddiness that is soon seen in the drying.

Now for the plate, cutlery and glass. The two first, wash up in two large common pitchers devoted to the purpose. They take less room to store than two more pans. As before, hot soda water is in one, soapy water is in the other, with a rinsing water to follow.

The pitcher plan is most excellent for the knives. First the danger of fumbling about with the blades is avoided, and secondly the handles are not turned yellow by immersion in the very hot water used for ridding them of grease.

Wash tumblers by holding first under the hot and then under the cold water tap with one of the pans set underneath to keep the water from splashing. To read all these directions may possibly suggest that my method is rather a lengthy business but it really makes for speed, as from start to finish there is in no sense a muddle.

DOT DESIGNS IN FLOUNCES

You may make them of any sort of lace provided that the mesh is heavy enough to support a milliner's wire under its outer edge, or may evolve them from chiffon, tulle or gauze ribbon provided that the material is closely plaited or fluted and made to stand far out from the throat at the back and sides. In front the Medici tapers into rather sharp points that join several inches below the throat, or that run to either side of a V or square cut neck.

That motor car modes have strongly influenced the fashions of everyday life? It was the open car which taught women the value of the wrap-overcoat, with its warm, cocoon-like draperies, and now, with the closed car as the favorite we have the pet-top coat furnished with a train.

Scalloped and dot designs are the favorites for petticoat flounces that will be subjected to everyday wear. Such petticoats escape the top of the buttoned boot by a generous margin, so there is really nothing to wear out dainty flounces, and as it is so short it is not likely to catch in the heels when stairs are descended. Therefore, in the interests of a narrow silhouette, the "drop" ruffle has been discarded and the new petticoats are very soft, clinging garments indeed.

Petticoats for evening wear have very deep embroidery flounces on fine carefully fitted tops, the top being usually of soft nainsook while the flounce is of scallop and dot embroidery or an English eyelot pattern on a sheer ground. This embroidery flounce is attached to the petticoat top with a ribbon-run beading, or with a strip of lace insertion, the lace being carried in tabs down into the flounce at intervals to give the effect of airy daintiness.

All petticoats are exquisitely fitted at the hips, gathers of any sort not being tolerated. Even the low-priced petticoats now fit much better at the top than used to be the case, but the woman who is very fastidious about the lines of her frock, buys her readymade petticoat a size too long and cuts it midway, fitting the upper part carefully by means of small dart and then attaching the lower part to this fitted upper with very scanty gathers. In this way a dollar petticoat may be made to fit as daintily as a \$5 model, and the cheap petticoats are really more serviceable for everyday wear as they stand the wear and tear of the wash tub more sturdily than the models of sheer nainsook and very fine embroidery.

RUFFLES FOR NIGHTGOWNS

There is a fancy for ruffles at the lower edge of new nightgowns, and some new trousseau models show quite a deep flounce of fine embroidery at the foot flounce and gown being joined by a ribbon-run beading. The long, straight gowns are really the prettiest, however, and hang in most graceful, clinging lines about the feet. All nightgowns should be several inches too long—that is, they should drag on the floor, entirely covering the wearer's feet so that the gown must be lifted a bit as she steps about. There is nothing so ungraceful as a short nightgown, which shows the feet and ankles, and the French blanchouse has a way of ironing the long nightgown with several little pleats, so that the garment falls in exquisite, clinging lines about the limbs.

There are adorable boudoir gowns of all over embroidery over slips of silk, and some of these are trimmed with Irish lace, which is always especially beautiful in combination with eyelot embroidery. The most delicate colors are selected for lining such negligees, and, in fact, bright hues of any sort are tabooed in lingerie wear of distinction. Faint pink, the palest baby blue and equally pale lavender and yellow, are used for linings and ribbons in the French garments, and only cheap, ready-made underwear shows vivid blue and pink ribbons. Just now there is a fad for black velvet ribbon in lingerie beadings, and it is rather amazing to see presumably cheerful trousseau garments run with black velvet and bearing black velvet rosettes and shower bows.
