NOTICE OF STREET IMPROVEMENT.

Notice is hereby given that at a regular adjourned meeting of the Common Council of the City of Pendleton, held on October 3rd, 1913, the following Resolution was adopted:

"Whereas the surveyor of the City of Pendleton, did on the 3rd day of October, 1913, under direction and by requirement of the Common Council file plans and specifications for an appropriate improvement of Alta Street from the West line of Main Street to the West line of Chestnut Street and of Chestnut Street to the South line of Alta Street to the North line of Webb Street, in said City of Pendleton, together with the estimates of the work to be done and the probable cost thereof, with a statement of the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvement, and the percentage of the total cost of improvement which each of such lots, parts of lots and parcels of land should pay on account of the benefits to be derived from such improvement; and

Whereas, the Council has examined such plans and specifications and found the same satisfactory and the estimates therefor to be in accordance with the probable cost of such work; and

Whereas, the property recommended by the City Surveyor to be included within the boundaries of the district benefited is, in the judgment of the Common Council property to be included within such improvement district, and no property is excluded therefrom which should properly be included therein; and

Whereas, the improvement of the hereinabove described portions of said Alta Street and Chestnut Street with gravel bitulithic pavement is at this time necessary, therefore, be it

Resolved, by the Common Council of the City of Pendleton that it is expedient to improve and it is hereby proposed to improve Alta Street from the West line of Main Street to the West line of Chestnut Street, and Chestnut Street from the South line of Alta Street to the North line of Webb Street by paving the same with gravel bitulithic pavement, such pavement to be made and laid down, and the street to have curbs and gutters and all other things, in accordance with, and as shown in the plans and specifications for the improvement of said portions of said streets prepared by Geary Kimbrell, City Surveyor, filed with the City Recorder on the 3rd day of October, 1913, which plans and specifications are hereby particularly referred to; and be it further resolved

Resolved, that the plans and specifications and estimates for such improvement, as prepared by the City Surveyor and filed with the Recorder of the City of Pendleton on the 3rd day of October, 1913, be and they are hereby approved and adopted; and be it further resolved

Resolved, that the cost of making such improvement shall be a charge and lien upon all lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvement, and the owners of such lots, parts of lots, and parcels of land so specially benefited by such improvement shall be liable for the payment of the costs thereof; and be it further

Resolved, that an assessment district is hereby created to be known as Assessment District No. 27, embracing the property to be assessed for the payment of such improvement, which assessment district shall include all lots, parts of lots and parcels of land lying and being within the district bounded and described as follows, to-wit:

Description of Local Improvement District No. 27.

Alta Street from the West Line of Main Street to the West Line of Chestnut Street.

Chestnut Street from the South Line of Alta Street to the North Line of Webb Street.

Beginning at the S. W. corner of lot 9, blk. 46, Reservation Addition to the Town of Pendleton, Oregon; thence N. 23 degrees 36 minutes W. along the center line of said blk. 46, 100 feet to a point which would be on a westerly projection of the North line of Alta Street; thence N. 66 degrees 24 minutes E. along the said projection of the North line of Alta Street 160 feet to the S. W. corner of lot 8, blk. 23 said Reservation Addition; thence N. 23 degrees 36 minutes W. along the East line of Chestnut Street and along a Northerly projection of said east line of Chestnut Street 175 feet; thence N. 66 degrees 24 minutes E. parallel with an 175 feet northerly from the North line of Alta Street, and through the center of Lots 13 and 4 in Blocks 26, 25, 24, 23, 22, 21 and also through the center of lots 11 and 4 in blocks 20, 19 and 18 respectively, all in Arnold and Ra-

Of special interest to the trade today was the arrival in the yards of five loads of calves from a lower Columbia river point. This is the greatest bunch of calves ever sent to market from one section since the local yards were established. The shipment was made by George W. Warren, the well known livestock man of Warrenton. The shipment was a through one and tarried in the yards only long enough to put in proper condition for forwarding. The shipment goes to George Dixon, the prominent Prineville feeder and shipper, who will put the stock on his extensive range in preparation for the market at a later date.

This shipment is said to be but the beginning of an extensive plan to restock the range of central and eastern Oregon. Advice from the interior indicate quite heavy purchases of Nevada cattle which will be put on the range in central Oregon. Some very heavy purchases have also been made in northern California and in the Klamath country of Oregon. There are heavy supplies of feed in the interior and but few cattle to consume it. Feed is cheap and cattle scarce, therefore, some of the most prominent interests of the interior are bringing the cattle to the feed.

Purchases of feeder stuff have been unusually heavy of late, but the movement has really just begun. Everyone in the interior is becoming interested in the proposition.

There was a steady to strong tone in the cattle trade at South Omaha today, top steers reaching \$9.25 and best cows and heifers \$7.25.

HOLIDAY MAKES MARKET QUIET

UNLOADING BY CALIFORNIA SPECULATORS CAUSES MARKET TO BE DOWN. (Courtesy of The Journal.) PORTLAND Ore., Oct. 14.—Yesterday was a legal holiday in all of the big American centers and all grain exchanges as well as stock markets were closed. Little business of any character has developed recently in the home market. A small amount of oats is reported purchased around \$24 a ton for No. 1 feed. California speculators are unloading their holdings of grain as well as wheat and naturally this is keeping the price to the minimum.

The entire barley trade is quiet but brewing is stagnant at lower prices generally. No 1 feed is finding a few takers at \$24 a ton tidewater track delivery, but no business has been confirmed recently for brewing. Quotation on the latter has been reduced to \$25@25.50 a ton local track. As a rule, farmers are not pushing the sale of either oats or barley.

Wheat prices continue on a nominal basis. A few lots of extra good stuff have been reported sold in a limited way at 78 1-2@79c bushel tidewater track, but the general quotation hangs around 78c today. Bluestem bids are nominal at 87 1-2@88 cents.

WOMAN SUES DOCTOR WHO REMOVED APPENDIX

SPOKANE, Wash., Oct. 14.—Convicted that her appendix was removed during an operation performed for another disorder a year ago by Dr. T. E. Hoxsey and other physicians, Mrs. Lydia Murray, who was ordered to pay the physician for services by a jury in the Spokane superior court last month, has undergone a second

operation to prove that she lost her appendix at the former operation.

Following the second operation she filed a motion for a new trial, declaring that the operation showed the appendix had been removed.

The second operation was performed after Mrs. Murray was ordered to pay Dr. Hoxsey \$285 for performing the first operation. Rather than pay for an operation in which she alleges that the surgeon removed her appendix without her authority, she submitted to a second operation to obtain evidence to support her contention that her appendix really had been taken out.
