Chicago Wheat Market Closes With May 3-8c Higher and July 1-4c Up for the Day.

CHICAGO, March 7.—Early weakness in the wheat market soon gave way to an improved feeling and the market closed 3-8c advanced for May and 1-4c for July.

PARIS, March 7.—The title of world's champion woman boxer is claimed by Mlle. Marthe Carpentier, who today announced her willingness to meet all comers. She is a good looking French brunette, 18 years of age, weighs 127 pounds, and is 5 ft. 3 in. in height. Mlle. Carpentier, who is in no way related to the French champion of the same name who has twice defeated Bombardier Wells, has been trained by M. Albany, an expert boxing and jiu-jitsu instructor for the past six months.

"I have always been fond of sport," she said today, "and I don't see why boxing should be forbidden to my sex. So long as brutality is prohibited, I don't see why a few rounds with the gloves occasionally shouldn't be beneficial to any young woman. I know it does me good.
