CHEWING TOBACCO IS NOT CHRISTIAN'S DUTY—BULGIN

(Continued from Page 1.)

In the sermon on the unparjurable sin. But in brief it is as explained in Matthew's gospel: "The attributing of the works of Christ to the little contemptible god Beelzebub, the god of flies. To do this was to destroy the last way of escape from sin, to break the last golden wire of hope to get to God. They could blaspheme God the father and creator, or Jesus Christ the Saviour for their work was done, but the Holy Spirit was still doing his work and was the last revelation for God to men. To destroy that was not to be forgiven." Dr. Bulgln and also Rev. T. F. Weaver took occasion to denounce in unparjuring terms those that had been

going out of their way to discourage the new converts, and saying that many could be bought with one drink of whiskey. As announced the sermon was particularly to businessmen, and the theme, "The King's Business." The text was found in 1 Sam. 21:8. "The king's business required haste." The evangelist said that the setting of the story was where David the shepherd lad had slain Goliath and was fleeing from the wrath of the envious Saul, and had gone to the priest Abimelech without food, arms or companion and asked for these same from him and explained the absence of such because he has hastened away from home on some urgent king's business which must be attended to and speeded up by any one on the way, just because it was the king's business.

"This was an oriental custom and is even true of us today. Men are not equal, they may have the same rights to live and make a living but there are different ranks, so to speak, and privileges granted to some that the other doesn't get. The king's right is the collected rights of all his subjects. The United States is you and I. The rights and laws of the United States has the right of way over you and

me because it is you and I in a bigger and collective form. So in this democratic age men obey good laws which are for the benefit, protection and progress of all society. The king of whom we speak tonight is King Jehovah, who is absolute monarch. You are his subjects whether you are loyal or disloyal, yet he is the king. He has the prior right of the creator. Right here let me say that we have no right to curse legitimate business, the creator of any kind of goods has a right to his profit and rightful gain from his skill. Your monarch has a right to the property invested in you. Then again there is the right of possession by redemption. What I buy and pay the price asked is mine. There is the right of care. An animal on pasture can eat its head off. So in this magnificent country and climate of Pendleton, you are disloyal to the king, the giver. You do not increase your responsibility by becoming a Christian, you lessen it for now you are disloyal and hinder other subjects."

Dr. Bulgln closed with an earnest appeal for all to come to such a sovereign. The audience was deeply moved and 12 or more were converted.

Refreshments were served after the program was concluded, Mrs. Mattie La Dow presiding at the table. Guests were present from all over the county and, altogether, the first social session of the society was distinct success.
